**DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY SIG** - 9:30 am - Larry Klees - At the next meeting Larry will announce what he is going cover at the meeting:

**COMPUTER ESSENTIALS SIG** - 9:30 am - Elise Edgell, your club President, will be leading the SIG that is dedicated to helping new and inexperienced users conquer their computer challenges.

**COMPUTER AIDED INVESTING SIG:** 9:30 am – We'll look at what happened in the Market, how the Market is reacting to the election, identify what to expect for the Christmas Rally and beyond. The technical material will use various tools and websites to compare trading of ETFs, Closed End funds, and Managed Funds from Rydex, ProFunds, etc. to look for strengths and weaknesses in each strategy and what models work with them.

2. The consignment table operates on a 90/10% basis — with the owner getting 90%, and the Club treasury 10%.

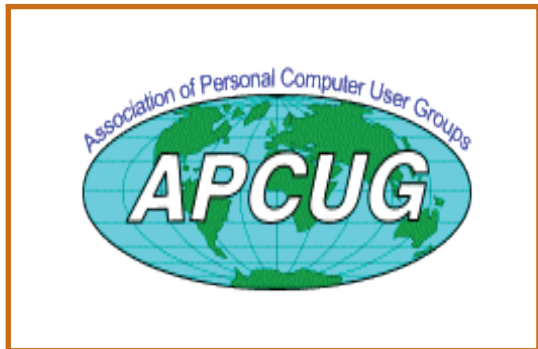
3. Fill out a tag on each item! It must contain: Seller's Name, NOCCC Membership Number, Item name, a short description and selling price.

Because of the new disposal laws, if you have a display or computer that doesn't sell, you must pick it up. The club has no storage room available, and can not legally put it in the trash.

6. Any items and/or money not picked up by 2 PM, will become the property of NOCCC and will be subject to disposal at the Club's discretion. As it is now illegal to put monitors or computers in the regular trash, you must agree to pick these items up if they don't sell.

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## Ted's Stuff

### Windows Live OneCare

Microsoft has been promoting a new online subscription-based PC "safety scanner" called Windows Live OneCare that is designed to ensure the health of your Windows-based computer. It will check for and remove viruses & spyware, get rid of junk on your drives, and improve PC's performance (through defragmentation, deleting temp files & invalid Registry keys, etc.). You can download a **free** manual program or a free 90-day trial at <http://safety.live.com/site/en-US/default.htm>. The latter is automatic (running in the background) and self-updating. Vista users currently have a beta utility available. Go to [http://safety.live.com/site/en-US/default.htm?s\\_cid=sah](http://safety.live.com/site/en-US/default.htm?s_cid=sah).

I tried the manual program and had it run overnight, since my computer has a lot of hard-disk space and a zillion files. The next morning, there was a report that it could not find any viruses or spyware (no surprise, since Norton's One Button Checkup had run earlier) and Defrag wasn't necessary (I use Diskeeper 2007 Pro). However, OneCare found 482 bad Registry entries and 2.8 GB of Temp files (which was surprising). After letting the utility create a Restore Point, I had OneCare remove the bad items. It couldn't remove 14 "bad" Registry items and about 700 MB of Temp/other files (probably because these, for some reason, were restricted). All-in-all, it wasn't a bad job. There is another site, PC Pitstop, where you can get a free scan to identify many problems that plague computer performance (<http://www.pcpitstop.com/store/optimize.asp?AdID=244291>).

### Criminals Increasingly Blend IT Threats


I commend to your reading an article at <http://www.eweek.com/article2/0,1895,1985999,00.asp?kc=EWEWEMNL071006EPW1A> that contends that malware writers, hackers and other cyber-criminals are combining multiple forms of IT threats in an attempt to amplify their efforts. The article states "that criminals are converging their attacks across multiple communications channels, such as e-mail, instant messaging networks and Web sites, and are also pulling together information-gathering techniques, including spyware, spam and phishing schemes, as they seek new ways to menace businesses and consumers." It also cites as an example, a threat aimed directly at users of eBay's PayPal online payment site and provides a link to more information on this. (I have received numerous phishing e-mails telling me to call a phony customer service call center and provide personal credit card information.) The article references a Microsoft article on malicious software removal at <http://www.microsoft.com/technet/security/default.mspx>.

### Internet Explorer 7

According to most reviews that I've seen, this free new Microsoft upgrade ([http://www.microsoft.com/windows/ie/downloads/default.mspx?mg\\_id=10017](http://www.microsoft.com/windows/ie/downloads/default.mspx?mg_id=10017)) is a big step forward from version 6 with lots of security enhancements and many of the features that have made Firefox so popular. So if you are a Windows XP user and are still using IE 6 (or earlier), you really should do the upgrade. I did and I like it too. PC Magazine reviewed the updated browser at <http://www.pcmag.com/article2/0,1895,2041269,00.asp>.

### Mozilla Firefox 2.0

On the other hand, you may want to take advantage of the Firefox upgrade, while not as drastic a change from its prior version, is still preferred by lots of folks and has more desired features than IE. According to eWeek, it has "the greatest out-of-the-box usability of any Web browser that we have tested." If that doesn't work, there is a **Norton Removal Tool** that you can download (<http://service1.symantec.com:80/Support/sharedtech.nsf/docid/2006031710323113?>) and it will uninstall all Norton 2007/2006/2005/2004/2003 products from your computer. Then you can reinstall the programs. This tool worked fine when I recently tried to remove NIS 2007 and NSW 2007 from my PC after a crash made them inoperable and they couldn't be removed using the regular procedures and even manually removing all program files and Registry entries.

I have known for a long time that they could be changed and personalized, it just seemed like one those "Oh what does it really matter!" type of things. Then a friend of mine asked me if it was possible to change the icons for his kids on the family computer and use their own pictures for their icons. I had forgotten how easy it is to do that. It is so easy almost anyone should be able to do it. The original chess piece was a 48x48 pixel shot. I took a family photo and cropped out a head shot that I then stored in My Pictures as a jpeg file.

It turned out to be a 500x500 pixels photo and worked just fine. WinXP adjusts the photo so that it fits in the icon frame.

Just follow these easy steps and you too can personalize your sign-on screen. You need to be logged in as administrator to have the privileges needed to change the icons.

Click on Start, then Control Panel, then User Accounts which brings up the User Accounts window. That window tells you to pick an account to change. Click on the account you want to change. The User Accounts screen then asks, "What do you want to change about your account?" At this point you want to click on "Change my Picture." The User Accounts window changes again and displays the stock icons below the instruction to "Pick a new picture for your account." Immediately below the icons is a magnifying glass next to the hot link text "Browse for more pictures." Place the mouse cursor over that text and it will be underlined. Click on the underlined text and it will cause a new window to be opened labeled, surprise, "Open." If the "Look in:" window doesn't default to the My Pictures folder, click on the down arrow at the right hand end of the window and navigate to the My Pictures folder or the one that your picture is in. Locate the picture you want to use, click on that file to highlight it, then click on open. The icon will be changed to that photo. Close the windows and you are done. Repeat for each user you want to change. ■

Vastly improved algorithms and architectural structures have been important, but the crucial factor has been the ability to cram ever smaller and more complex circuits on a semiconductor chip. That ability is now approaching a limit posed by atomic size and increasing influence of quantum effects. We may have to learn how to do more with what we already have if we want to further improve computers so that they'll be able to predict the weather or model the Big Bang, to mention just a few challenges.

From an electro-mechanical standpoint every digital computer, no matter how primitive or advanced, consists of on-off electrical switches connected in a circuit. In semi-

conductor-based systems the binary 0's and 1's are represented by electrons that carry a negative charge, and missing electrons, called "holes," with positive charge. That is simple and straightforward enough. But wait, there is more...

There can be no electricity without magnetism. They are like heads and tails, yin and yang, up and down. Electrons, the elemental carriers of electricity, also are elementary magnets. You can, very much simplified, think of them as spinning spheres of electricity, tiny electromagnets in other words. Depending on the direction of spin, the magnetism points up or down. Technology making use of the magnetic properties of electrons is often referred to as "spintronics." So far, computers ignore the magnetic state of the electrons, but what if we learned to use it for additional information storage?

About 50 years ago scientists learned how to manipulate and record the magnetic properties of electrons and certain atomic nuclei to examine the composition of substances, using a technique called nuclear magnetic resonance (NMR). Eventually that technique was extended to examine the characteristics of human tissue. The name was changed to Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) to avoid the term "nuclear" with its negative connotations, although it has nothing to do with damaging radiation or nuclear energy in this case.

More recently, in the late 90's, scientists at IBM learned how to use spintronics to make very small, highly sensitive read-heads for use with computer hard drives. The sensors consist of a microscopic sliver of semiconductor sandwiched between two thin magnetic layers. The top layer is a permanent, "hard" magnet, but the bottom layer is a soft magnet that changes magnetic orientation easily as it passes over the magnetic regions on the disk. If both magnets in the head are oriented in the same direction, electrons align magnetically in the same direction and move easily through the semiconductor. If the magnetic layers point in opposite directions, the electron spin is reversed as it moves through the semiconductor, affecting its mobility and therefore the amount of current. Clever, isn't it? Practically all newer hard drives use that technology now.

If computers could be designed to use both the electrical charge and the magnetic state of electrons, each unit of information could have four different quaternary values (0,1,2, and 3) instead of the two binary values (0 and 1) currently used, resulting in greatly increased performance. But the semiconductors must be magnetic to recognize the magnetic 'up' or 'down' state of electrons. Magnetic semiconductors are few and far between, and so far none remain magnetic at room temperature.

If the material problems can be solved, we may be looking at future computers that are not only more powerful, but also easier to use. Because magnetic semiconductors retain their logic states without power, systems could be instant-on and use less power. Also, principal functions of a computer, such as logic operations, communication



# Free Up Megabytes of Disk Space

Pull Quote – these folders could be the culprits that are chewing up valuable storage area.

Look in your Windows folder and count how many folders you have that start with “\$NtUninstall”. They are all related to various patches, updates and service packs for XP. Those \$NtUninstall folders are created when you install a Microsoft Service Pack, a hot fix, or certain security updates. Some of these folders could date back almost to the day you first installed your computer.

Their names are in blue, and they are all marked as hidden and read only. If you don’t see them in the Windows folder, open the Tools menu, and select Folder Options from the drop down menu. After the Folder Options dialog box appears, activate the View tab, then left-click the Show hidden files and folders radio button. Click OK to close the dialog box and the hidden folders should appear. If nothing happens close down Windows Explorer and restart it. You don’t need to restart your computer; simply open Windows Explorer again.

Why should you do this? If you’re getting low on disk space and the usual remedies haven’t freed up enough space, these folders could be the culprits that are chewing up valuable storage area. If you have had Windows installed for more than a year and you are conscientious about keeping your system up-to-date, these useless folders are probably tying up gigabytes of data. Enough of them can have the unfortunate side effect of noticeably slowing down virus and spyware scans. It also takes longer to defrag your disk drive. An accumulation of unnecessary or extraneous data on your system will eventually affect system performance and in extreme cases cause drive errors.

The files within the \$NtUninstall folder provide instructions on how your computer uninstalls a Windows update. Each folder has a specific name ending in the name of a particular Windows modification. If you were to go to add/remove programs and select a Windows update to uninstall, the information on how to run this process would come from the corresponding \$Ntuninstall folder.

You can safely delete all these folders if you have no plans to uninstall any of the related patches. As updates and patches accumulate, these types of fold-

between circuits, and data storage, could be integrated in a single material, resulting in smaller and faster computers with high data-storage capacities and fast performance.

Making spintronic computers possible depends on chemists formulating magnetic semiconductors able to support the technology. Much progress is being made, but it will take a while longer. Not surprisingly, this article was based on an article in Chemical and Engineering News, Aug. 28, 2006.

## Ulead's DVD MovieFactory 4 Software

I have stacks of VHS and 8mm cassettes that are probably reaching the end of their life. I would love to transfer these to digital format before it is too late. In an ideal world, I would capture the video from each tape and edit it into a movie that would be fun to watch. But, in the real world, this will never happen because of the amount of time involved. So, when an ad caught my eye for a program claiming to be able to transfer video from an analog source directly to a DVD I thought that I had found a solution. I could transfer my old analog tapes to digital format and then, at a later date, if warranted, I could edit the video. If I never got around to doing the edit, at least the data would be in digital format.

The program which I am referring to is Ulead's DVD MovieFactory 4. It is a relatively inexpensive program which lists for \$49.99 and has a street price from \$35.00 up. (Ulead has a come out with DVD MovieFactory@ 5 and a new program DVD MovieFactory@ 5 Plus.) It will run on computers starting with an Intel Pentium III 800 MHz or Athlon 800 MHz and for operating systems from Windows 98SE through Windows XP. The minimum memory requirements are modest (250 MB) with 500 MB recommended. My computer with an AMD Athlon XD 2600, 1.9 GHz with 512 MB RAM easily met the requirements. I also have an AGP nVidia GeForce Video Card with 128 MB memory which met video card recommendations. (When editing video "shared video memory" is not recommended because this type of computing is very memory intensive. Many laptop computers use shared video memory and low-end desktops also do this because it is less expensive.) The other required devices are a DVD burner and, to capture analog video, video capture card. The box listed the names of DVD burners which seem to include the major companies plus it says "and more." I have a LiteON DVD burner which works with the program. I was not concerned with the compatibility with DVD camcorders because I do not own one.

The key element to accomplish what I



wanted to do was an analog video capture device which is compatible with the program. This was listed as an optional requirement and the box says PCI, TV tuner, USB capture devices compliant with WDM standards and PC cameras." WDM stands for Windows Driver Model, a standard which has been around since Windows 95/

This review is long overdue because I could not get it to capture analog video and I spent a lot of time attempting to track down the problems. I have a problem with this program. Straight-to-Disc is touted as an easy way to save your VHS tapes straight to DVD. This is not a high-end video editing program. It is targeted at users without an extensive video editing background. My guess is that it will appeal to users without an in-depth knowledge of video capture devices. I have an analog capture device, an ADS Instant DVD USB2.0. It came bundled with Ulead's DVD MovieFactory 2.0 SE. I assumed that it would also work with Ulead's DVD MovieFactory 4.0. Unfortunately, that was an erroneous assumption. After much searching on the Ulead Web site, I finally located an answer to the question about whether the ADS would work with DVD Movie Factory 4.0. The terse answer supplied was "No..."

I would strongly recommend that before you purchase a video editing program, you make sure that it will work with the equipment that you have on your computer. If you are intending to purchase any equipment, be sure that it will work with the program that you want to use. Do not assume that if it works with a light version of a program that is bundled with the equipment that it will work with the full version of the program or with a later version of the same program. Ulead seems to be particularly bad in this regard.

Even though DVD MF4 will not accomplish my primary reason for obtaining the program, I decided to see what else it would do. The version that I am reviewing does not have the ability to make an audio or data CD. It does have the ability to make video disks in several different formats including DVDs and VCDs. It also has the capability of making slideshows. You can even mix video and a slideshows on the same disk.

I have had some experience with putting together slideshows. I found DVD MF4 did not give me as much control over the way each photo is displayed as the program which I have been using.

The program has some video editing capabilities. It is easy to cut out the goofs in the videos such as the video of the pavement because I forgot to turn off the camcorder. There are templates for creating menus on the DVD. I have found that it is a good idea to break a long video up into chapters. Then, if you want to show someone a particular portion of the video, it is easy to go to that chapter without having to sit through unwanted video.

I have made some VCDs and SVCDs. This is an economical way to get my video into a digital format that can be played on a standard DVD player. Because a CD has so much less storage than a DVD I can only get about 20 to 30 minutes of video on a CD. This is really enough time to get your edited material into a movie format. Also, if you are planning to show others the video, 20 to 30 minutes is probably about the most amount of time that it reasonable to expect someone to watch your video of you trip, baby, pet, etc.

Because this is no longer the current version of DVD MF,

I am not going to go into detail about what it can or cannot do. I have not checked the new version of DVD MovieFactory or DVD MovieFactory Plus. To get more information about them go to [www.ulead.com](http://www.ulead.com). Regardless, if I want to edit my home movies, I would rather spend my time learning how to use a higher-end video editing program. The original capture program which came with my ADS Instant DVD USB 2.0 works well for transferring analog video directly to a DVD or to a hard disk and is very easy to use.

I cannot stress strongly enough that before you decide to convert your analog videos to digital, you must learn something about the terminology. The concepts of what is involved in the transfer are also important. The quality of your capture may be determined by the speed of your computer and your hard disk. There are different types of analog capture devices available. If you do not understand the terms and the concepts involved in this process it is easy to make some mistakes in what you purchase.

What I do recommend you do is to do your homework before you make a purchase. You can download DVD MovieFactory 5 for a free 30-day trial. Once you have the combination that will work for transferring those analog tapes, be sure to do it while it is still possible to make the transfer. ■

## Linux Starter Kit

Interested in exploring Linux, but don't want to get bogged down, lost, or cause problems with your Windows operating system by installing a new operating system? The answer is at hand – complete step-by-step guidance using the SAMS (Pearson Education Publishing) Linux Starter Kit.

The Linux Starter Kit includes both the SuSE Linux 10.1 operating system on a DVD plus a 124 page book covering what you need to know to install and use SuSE and included applications like OpenOffice. The SuSE installation includes a complete reference manual in PDF format which is also downloaded. The Kit permits installing SuSE while retaining Windows on either a separate or the same hard drive provided at least 500 MBytes are available (2.5 G Bytes is recommended).

While the Linux expert can download multiple versions of Linux such as SuSE, Debian, and Fedora, to compile and install, we Linux tyros appreciate a ready-to-go version on one DVD, which the Kit includes. Just put the DVD in its drive and reboot your PC. Then follow the step-by-step on-screen guidance. The first chapter in the book covers the installation of SuSE 10.1, one of the most popular versions of Linux. While most users will see a succession of graphic windows during the installation if your PC has limited RAM or hard drive space you may find the DVD defaulting to a text mode for the installation. That mode is also covered in the book.

The second chapter describes the two most popular Linux desktops: KDE and Gnome. For a Windows user, the KDE desk-



top layout will not be a surprise. It shows application icons plus a taskbar at the bottom of the desktop much as Windows does. The taskbar can be relocated on the desktop if that is your preference.

The book assumes the user has a nodding acquaintance with Linux since a number of concepts and labels will be a bit cryptic to the uninitiated. For that reason it is recommended the new user read through chapter one before commencing the installation. That will ensure a smooth and quick installation of SuSE.

One of the programs installed will be Konqueror, a combination file manager and web browser, a tool commonly used in Linux files housekeeping. One feature that Windows does not have is the means to mark any file with “permissions,” that is who can read, write, or execute the file. That together with selectable Linux-run-levels and the super user password keeps the uninitiated and uninvited out of the files they should not need access to.

Unique to SuSE is YaST (Yet another Setup Tool). It is provided to allow the user to load and install software beyond that included in the original Linux installation. It is also used to get Linux connected to the system hardware, although a modicum of Linux knowledge is needed to get those connections made. My experience was the SuSE installation connected to my laser printer with no input from me. YaST also facilitates network hookups for both servers and client computers. YaST likewise allows setting security components such as firewalls. An additional miscellaneous category in YaST provides a number of other control features such as a system log for use in trouble shooting installation problems.

Unique to Linux is the File System Hierarchy Standard which all Linux installations use. The required directories titles are: the root directory (accessible only by super user (administrator) password); the bin directory, which holds executable files; boot directory holding those files required to initiate the SuSE system at startup; dev directory which holds device definitions needed for user access; the etc directory for system and service configuration files; home directory for multiple user's subdirectories; lib directory for libraries used by the bin executables; media directory for CDROMs, DVDs, and floppies interfaces; the mnt directory for access to external file systems or devices mount points; opt directory for any optional application software; and finally, the proc directory holding temporary process information which exists only when the computer is running. Chapter five concludes by discussing in detail how to manipulate

files in the File System Hierarchy Standard using Konqueror.

The final chapter discusses a number of alternatives for finding help in installing and using SuSE. My limited experience with SuSE so far indicates the help features of the system are not as comprehensive as a new user might like. It remains to be determined if more information is out there in SuSE land that I have not yet uncovered.

This evaluation of the Linux Starter Kit was made with a 2.5 GHz CPU, a forty MByte hard disk, a laser printer, and broadband web access. I am pleased with the Kit and suggest it for anyone who would like to give Linux a try without a great investment in time or money. I will be using SuSE for the indefinite future as my Linux selection. The Kit lists for \$40 at the Sams web site (<http://www.samspublishing.com/bookstore/product.asp?isbn=0672328879&rl=1>), but is discounted and has free shipping. It also is available at Amazon.com at about \$28. While SuSE 10.0 can be downloaded free the book can be a life saver especially for a new user's first exposure to what is becoming an operating system very competitive with Windows.

## Photoshop Finishing Touches

This book is not for "Photoshop" beginners, but it is a treasure house of chapters on Key Concepts, Frames and Borders, Color and Artistic Effects, and Presentation techniques. The author, Dave Cross, is Senior Development, Education and Curriculum, for the National Association of Photoshop Professionals (NAPP). His introduction likens using this book to cooking and invites the reader to try his recipes then add their own variations. The table of contents gives visual illustrations for the information included in each of the book's four chapters.

### Chapter One, Key Concepts:

Thirteen techniques, Key Concepts, Layer Masks, Quick Mask, Define Brush, Define Pattern, Strokes, Free Transform, Filters, Blend Modes, Illustrator to Photoshop, Adjustment Layers, Blending Options, Layer Strokes and Threshold, are provided and a tear out summary is included. While I've used "Photoshop" for several years, I've never been comfortable with many of these concepts. Now, I'm beginning to use them with confidence.

### Chapter Two, Frames and Borders:

Twenty-eight techniques for making frames and borders are presented along with variations on each. I won't list them all, but one I particularly liked was named Gallery Print, by Scott Kilby. This technique includes placing the photo on a page, outlining it with a shaded border, and adding a title outside the



border to produce the look of a print purchased from a gallery.

### Chapter Three, Color and Artistic Effects:

Twenty-six techniques and variations on these techniques are provided. I would never have imagined most of these techniques and have only tried a few, but the ones I have tried include Making Colors Pop Out, Burned-In Edges, and Soft Focus.

### Chapter Four, Presenting Your Work:

Five techniques including Photoshop Slideshows, PDF Presentations, Smart Picture Presentations, Web Photo Galleries, and InDesign Contact Sheet are provided. These techniques, which range from creating a simple slide show to customized websites, are intended to let the user really show off the results of using "Photoshop."

## System Mechanic v 6.0a

Iolo visited NOCCC several months back and demonstrated System Mechanic. I was tempted to buy it but had been getting progressively more and more tired of all the problems PCs have with spyware, keyloggers and other forms of malware; the need for defragmentation, registry maintenance, etc., and just wanted to avoid the whole issue. So even though they were offering it for only \$25 to NOCCC members, I let it pass.

Recently, I saw it at Best Buy for \$39.95 and decided to buy it. System Mechanic is intended to compete with Norton SystemWorks. In fact, it has a plethora of tools NSW doesn't even touch. What does System Mechanic contain? Well, when you start the program you'll see that it is arranged into three groups. The first group is a column of buttons: Home, Optimize, Clean, Repair, Protect, Maintain, and Options. Each button brings up a panel with further applets which I'll discuss below. The second section is the main section. It is a bit graphical, intended to convey some intelligence and does so by analyzing your system for the following issues: clutter, speed, safety, fitness, update and active care. These all seem to be something approaching wizards. They seem pretty smart in that each applet tells you the status of your PC after it's done analyzing a certain aspect of system performance. There are two speedometer-like gauges at the top indicating overall health and overall security. Now, the first column of buttons is:

1. Home: takes you to the panel described above.
2. Optimize. This screen has the following applications:



- a. Increase Internet speed, with three applets
  - b. Speed Up Hard Drives, with three applets
  - c. Memory Mechanic to defragment RAM
  - d. Popup Blocker
  - e. Manage Windows Startup, with two options for managing processes that load at boot time
  - f. System Customizer for Windows appearance, security, performance, and more
  - g. Manage Running Programs, a process manager
3. Clean has the following features:
- a. Junk File Removal Tool
  - b. Uninstall Software
  - c. Internet Cleanup and Privacy Tool
  - d. Duplicate File Inspector
4. Repair has the following applets
- a. Repair and Clean the Registry with three registry management applets
  - b. Fix Drive and System Problems with three applets
  - c. Find and Remove Spyware
  - d. Fix broken shortcuts
5. Protect
- a. Fix Security Vulnerabilities
  - b. Automatic System Protection
  - c. Permanently Delete Files, an applet and a wizard
  - d. Track Windows Changes

Maintain and Options are maintenance applets.

The final column comprises five buttons that will take you to five wizards, called Power Tools, which will perform intelligent system maintenance tasks. These Power Tools are called:

1. PC TotalCareT
2. PC Cleanup
3. PC Accelerator
4. PC Security Optimizer
5. PC Repair

As you can see, you can get a lot of bang for your buck here. Well, having worked with it for about a week, all I can say is caveat emptor. Before I discuss the problems I had, let me qualify myself. (1) The program didn't come with a written manual. Fair warning #2: I didn't test the program in a systematic fashion and that may have been unwise. I should have tried one applet at a time and then tested my system to see if everything was working because one of these applets caused me problems, but I don't know which one. Fair warning #3: I am using Microsoft Office 2007 Beta. Beta software is provided "As-Is" and known to be potentially unstable. But I'd had no problems with Word prior to working with System Mechanic.

So what happened? All of a sudden, when I load Word, its installer loads and eventually asks me for the program disk! Next problem: I use Panda Security Suite for my Firewall and anti-spyware. All of a sudden, the program is telling me that the script blocking level is set too low. I checked and the setting is high. So I reinstalled the program but that hasn't fixed the problem. Finally, I purchased a program called Registry Mechanic about a week prior to purchasing System Mechanic. When I used the two registry cleaners, they're quite different.

So what happened? Well, since I purchased Registry Mechanic first, I naturally ran it first. I ran System Mechanic later to see if it could find any new problems. When I was disappointed in System Mechanic, I re-ran Registry Mechanic. To my surprise, Registry Mechanic found around 120 problems! These two programs don't think alike at all. Moreover, the user-interface is more detailed in Registry Mechanic, though they both take the same path of cleaning the registry, optimizing and compacting it.

To summarize, I would stay away from System Mechanic right now. I've used more features than I've written about, but I'm consistently unimpressed with the program. The goal and design of the program was lofty, but the execution leaves a lot to be desired. Almost all applets have an identical interface which is rather uninformative. I'll probably work with System Mechanic a bit more, but I may just return it if I can, or simply remove it from my PC. I don't fully trust it right now.

System Mechanic is from Iolo Technologies (<http://www.iolo.com/sm/ads/landing/index.cfm?pid=445F2C56-41B2-449B-8E15-F880DD92137D>) and the vendor has it on sale for \$40. Amazon.com also has it for \$40 with free shipping and there is a \$20 rebate. It is \$40 at Best Buy, but available at all the major home electronics and office supply stores.

**Review Editor's note:** According to the Iolo web site, System Mechanic has received numerous awards including "Editors Pick" from PC World, "Editors' Choice" from c|net, and "5 Stars" from PC Computing. You can read more about the software at the aforementioned web site.

**Editor's note:** While it is true that a printed manual is not included with the program (a common practice these days), on the CD that my copy of System Mechanic came on, there is only one subdirectory and it is labeled Documentation. In that directory is a 340K Byte help file. Clicking on the compiled HTML help file brings up the System Mechanic Help Window that, in sequence, tells a user about various aspects of the program. The sixth item in that sequence is "Before You Use System Mechanic" which displays the following message.

**“Caution!** Before you manipulate any important data, it is strongly advised to make a current backup (my highlight. Before installing any program, a full image backup is a smart move.) System Mechanic interacts with intricate parts of your PC and can encounter unexpected configurations, incompatibilities, or a pre-existing system corruption. iolo technologies has extensively researched and tested System Mechanic compatibility and safety; however there might be instances where its tools could fail or lead to a loss or corruption of data. This behavior has never been encountered in our testing, but we cannot guarantee that it will never happen.”

Anyone that heeds the above advice can recover from any subsequent software problems, **regardless of the cause.** Of those that don't heed the advice, most will be lucky, but the rest will rue the choice. Apparently, Mr. Carmeli falls into the latter category. ■

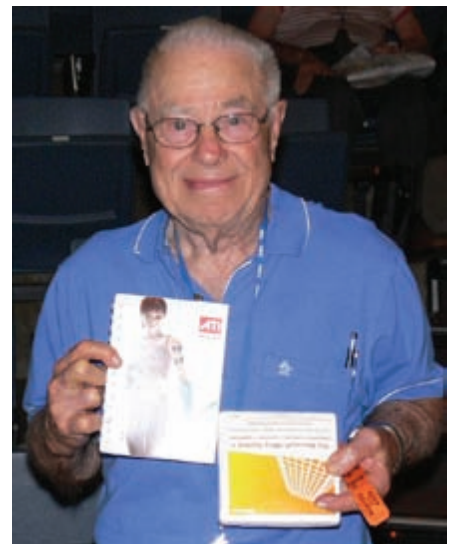
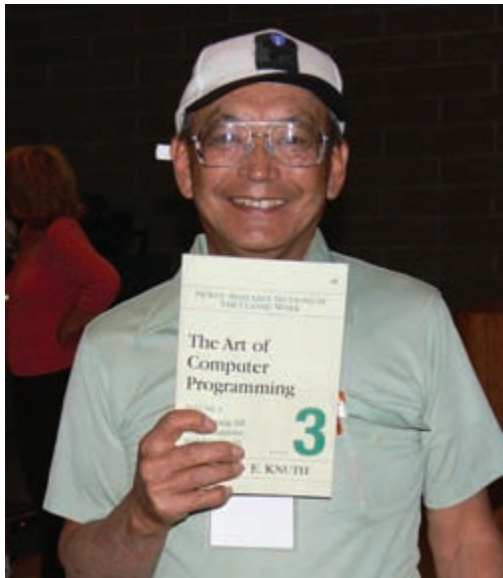
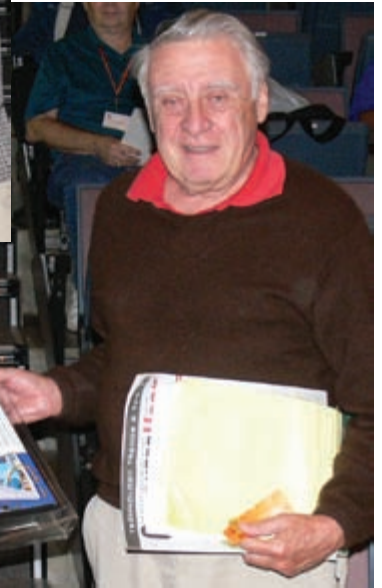
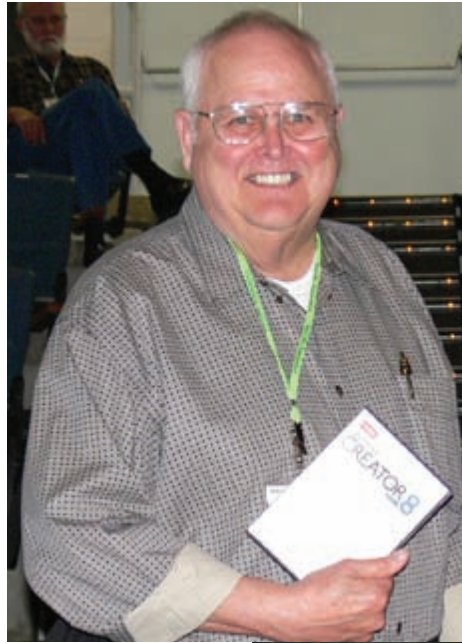

### Main Meeting Report

We got two presentations in one at the November meeting. First, Shin Ito from Lite Wave introduced us to their popular new product: Radiant Frames, great for displaying your printed photos and excellent gift items for the holidays. Second, Jim Sanders introduced the Microsoft Digital Image Suite 2006 -- perfect for preparing and printing photos for use in Radiant Frames.

President Elise Edgell ran the meeting. She first announced the NOCCC annual Holiday Party, coming up in December at her house. It was a potluck. She was providing a turkey -- and Herb Wong volunteered again to do his expert carving. All members were invited and just needed to RSVP to her at [president@noccc.org](mailto:president@noccc.org).

She also reminded everyone that annual elections were coming up in June 2007. It's important to prepare for this ahead of time. She called for volunteers to dedicate time to help the club. Without help, the club would simply stop functioning. She mentioned critical areas where help was needed. Jim Sanders spent over 40 hours a month on the Orange Bytes and could definitely use help. Herb Wong needed help maintaining the website. Help would also be appreciated setting up and taking down meetings. Aside from these, the club can't function without officers. She asked for anyone who can volunteer time to e-mail her at [president@noccc.org](mailto:president@noccc.org).

Jim Sanders mentioned he would be retiring from doing the Bytes at the end of his current term in June.

When Shin Ito took the floor, there

were already photographs being beautifully displayed on the table in Radiant Frames. His company, Lite Wave from Santa Fe Springs, started out almost seven years ago selling small, convenient fluorescent lights. Fairly recently, they developed Radiant Frames -- basically just picture frames with small fluorescent lights behind them. They came in light brown and mahogany (black) colors.

He ran through a brief slide presentation that started with ads for two of their other products -- the fluorescent lights and decorative LED lights. Then, a very simple four-step process was shown for setting up Radiant Frames -- 1) Shoot the picture, 2) Print it, 3) Put it in the Radiant Frame, 4) Plug it in.

Shin mentioned that the frames were made of solid oak. They were very durable and to date, no one had ever returned the product.

Radiant Frames took a very low wattage of electricity -- one to two cents a day. Shin had the current display items on battery power, but he recommended against that. It was like keeping a flashlight on batteries for an extended time. The batteries wouldn't last long. He mentioned that some customers plugged Radiant frames into electronic timers (not included), making them go on and off at specified times.

He said they worked well as night lights. Some customers told him they couldn't sleep without the Radiant Frames on. The frames do a great job displaying pictures taken on vacations -- and displaying grandkids. They make excellent gift items for the holidays and beyond.

Shin displayed some positive reviews of Radiant Frames from magazines like PC Magazine and USA Today.

Members asked several questions, as follows:

\* In what sizes do Radiant Frames come? Only one right now -- large enough for a standard 4x6 image. Lite Wave was working to develop frames based on LED technology. These would allow more flexibility in size. Hopefully, some offerings would be available next year.

\* How could you avoid the standard fading of printouts? Higher quality

ink could be used. Also, if printouts faded, you'd still have a softcopy of the image. You could simply reprint it. The images displayed at the meeting had been printed two years ago. (There was no sign of fading.)

\* How much for Radiant Frames? \$19.99 each online. This included the frame, the fluorescent back panel, a 3-pack of special paper, and the AC adapter. The site was [www.radiantframes.com](http://www.radiantframes.com). For meeting attendees, Shin was offering an extra 3-pack of paper with each unit sold.

\* What printers are recommended? Inkjet only, laser cannot be used. Most inkjet printers work fine. Some photo-quality didn't work as well, due to the extra ink they produce. That makes it hard for the light to penetrate the image. Some older all-in-one printers were also not very good.

\* You can only use the special paper that comes with the product? No, but it provides the best quality output. What's recommended is translucent paper -- not transparent. Transparent paper will allow the light to shine through the image. However, when the light is not on, the picture will seem to disappear. By contrast, with white translucent paper, the photo will have a white background during daylight when the fluorescent light is turned off. Regular photos will also display, but not as brightly as printouts on translucent paper. The concept behind Radiant Frames was similar to that for the lighting of x-rays. In fact, customers have been known to light ultrasound images with Radiant Frames.

\* What size paper should be used? 6x8, i.e., A5.

\* How much for more of the special paper? \$7.99 for a ten-pack on the website.

\* Are Radiant Frames sold anywhere in retail shops? Yes, but only in a few gift and novelty shops. The website is probably the easiest way to buy them. You can also purchase locally at Lite Wave in Santa Fe Springs.

Next, Jim began his presentation on Microsoft Digital Image Suite 2006. He noted that you could try it free for 60 days. It could be downloaded and he

easily found the exact web page by googling "digital image suite download".

Jim mainly let the product speak for itself -- by running four instructional videos included with it.

"Exploring Digital Image Suite 2006" provided a brief introduction to using the product. It showed how to manipulate pictures and objects, use tools, stack objects, and zoom.

"Basic Photo Touchup" showed how to use the AutoFix and Exposure/Lighting tools to brighten photos that were too dark. It also showed the Color AutoFix tool for photos with unnatural colors, the straightening of crooked photos, the AutoCrop tool, Crop To Fit, and the shrinking of a photo for display on a PDA.

"Advanced Photo Editing" showed some really nice editing tricks. With the Edge Finder, it showed how to outline a person in a photo, cut her out as an object, and paste her into another photo. It brightened the result with the Exposure/Lighting tool. It showed the ease with which unflattering lines could be erased under her eyes. It resized her in comparison to the background she was pasted in. With the Magic Selection Wand, it selected the gray sky in the background and changed it to a deep beautiful blue. With the Erase tool, it removed some tourists shown in the background. The result was a flattering picture of a woman against a beautiful tropical background. Text was added. Finally, the tutorial showed how the photo could be shrunk and inserted in an e-mail for easy delivery.

"Organizing Your Pictures and Videos" showed how to import pictures and videos from a camera. These went into a nice photo browser feature. The Label Painter could put labels on objects in the browser. The tutorial showed how to apply and erase these labels. Pictures in the directory could be flagged for later printing. They could also be given ratings from 1 to 5 stars. All pictures with certain ratings could be printed or displayed in slideshows.

After the instructional videos, Jim commented that he felt the Digital Image Suite was nice in that it contained a large number of high-end photo editing features accessible by easy point-and-

click menus. Layered (or "stacked") editing was a pretty advanced tool.

He then demonstrated the power of the Exposure AutoFix and Contrast AutoFix tools. He took a photo that was so dark, nothing in it could be recognized. After being processed by the AutoFix tools, it brightened up considerably and looked like a normal picture of a couple with their child, taken in normal daylight.

A member in the audience gave Jim a thumb drive with some photos. He opened one displaying a pride of lions. He processed it a little, zooming in on specific lions and cropping out the rest. Then he printed the result on Radiant Frames paper. He took that and put it in a Radiant Frame on the table. He plugged that in, turned it on, and it displayed the lions beautifully.

A member asked if you could only print on one side of the Radiant Frames paper. Jim said yes, only on the matte finish side, not the slick side. He also recommended never touching the matte finish side.

Someone else asked the price of Digital Imaging Suite 2006. Jim said he saw it at Circuit City for \$79.00.

## Computer Aided Investing SIG

### Market Review:

This past month to everyone's surprise, the Dow reached all-time highs, passing the 12,000 level for the first time ever. October is generally a down month, but not this year. All major indices were up, even though last month it was unclear the up-trend could continue. The strength has been in the large cap stocks. Normally, we would hope to see the technical sector providing the leadership, but earnings reports have

depressed a few key stocks to make the SOX index stop rising and now trend sideways. The rest of the technical picture is very good for the short term with indicators giving bullish signs for the trend to continue. Now as we enter November, institutions are rebalancing portfolios and we see a dip in the trend. One newsletter was skeptical about the rally since the July lows and attributed most of the gains to short covering. The big gains were made in only 9 days -- and those days were short covering days as the big guys were covering their assets.

Another prevalent opinion is that the market has been propped-up by pre-election activities which has influenced oil prices, interest rates, the strength of the dollar, and no new terrorist events in the mid-East. Boy, if we could keep those activities around for a while longer, the market could do no wrong. After the election, it is feared that these props will be removed and the market cave-in. Other opinions are optimistic because we usually see a bullish market for a few days before and after the mid-term election and then the Seasonal calendar effect where November and December are up-months, and so on.

Will all these factors over-ride what we see in the charts? There is enough mixed opinion to shake the faith of a good technical analyst. Of course if we have used our computer tools as a guide, we have made a barrel of money in the past few months, and it should be OK to cash-in or take some profits. Many local investors have reduced their positions because the downside risk has grown large and the likelihood of large gains in the near term has grown small. Our straw vote on the Dow for next month was evenly split, up, down, and sideways. Time for caution.

### Presentation:

Trading in Today's Markets -- The subject of trading models was reviewed as a lead-in to what makes up a model, how we test it, and how we use it. In attempts to answer the question "Do the old models still work?" we looked

at a paper that studied 65 models developed around 1996-1999 and the results of re-testing them some 4 years after they were developed, i.e. in the period of 1999-2003. The results were very disappointing, with average gains dropping from 26% to 2% and drawdowns increasing from -8% to -20%. The conclusions from this paper were that the old models did not work well in the current markets. So, could they be fixed by optimization? That would update the parameters testing in current periods, and then following up with an out-of-sample test. This was an opportunity to use the IO program with AmiBroker to run an array of optimizations and walk forward tests. I used some popular and successful models from a few years back - Ruttr and Fubar5x. Over the period of several weeks, I ran over 1600 optimizations and backtests, changing configurations and time periods. This resulted in a lot of data and a lot of variation in performance. I'm still trying to find some general patterns. Using the best runs for a given period, the highest average returns were 25%, which occurred during the period 1995-2004. For 1995-2006, the average returns dropped to 21%. Out-of-sample tests for one-year intervals were only around 4% compared to the 24-27% during the in-sample optimizations. The one-year tests only had one trade, and there was some truncation in the results. A different test procedure is needed to start/stop the period when the model buys and sells so the performance for a complete trade is recorded. What I've learned is that the models are still good, but less effective than when originally developed and testing is helpful to rule out candidates that are worthless. It also means that if the performance is poor, optimization may improve results, but cannot overcome the lack of a good model. It also appears that models like Fubar5x that were highly tuned for past years, will not match that performance with re-optimization. ■

## AmiBroker SIG

This meeting spent time looking at the various parts of Automated Analysis – which introduced the topics of Scanning, Exploring, Backtesting and Optimization, and we only touched on the first two. Using the functions in the AA window requires an AFL program which you select and load from its appropriate directory. This can be done from the AA window, or from the tree of files in the Charts window, and with the right mouse button, select the file and choose Analysis. Scanning is used to process an AFL file for alerts or signal buy/sell dates, or to create composites. The composite is a very important feature in AmiBroker used for creating averages of multiple securities, saving a signal file for use in later tests, plots and explorations. The Add to Composite function creates an artificial ticker (Group 253), which can be used just as any other ticker. A sample program was demonstrated that computed the average of all the stocks in a given sector. Many variations of this program are useful to create composites of watchlists so the composite performance of a portfolio or basket of stocks can be treated as a single plot.

We covered the explore function by demonstrating a few exploration AFL programs that were used to screen and rank stocks and save the results in a watchlist. By using a watchlist, multiple screens could be run and results combined by saving them in the same watchlist. The explore function generates a spreadsheet-like report that can be used as part of debugging various programs, by reporting the results of intermediate calculations and then commenting-out those addcolumn statements when not needed. It takes a bit of practice to learn how the flow of the explore programs work so programming logic benefits from the automated looping as Amibroker evaluates multiple

tickers and the range of dates specified.

To help in learning how AmiBroker works, a collection of 48 programs was posted and made available to the members using AFL-Tidbits, so they can download the indicators, signals, ranking programs, etc. Members who have not signed up for AFL-Tidbits should contact me if they are interested. Other programs will be made available in the future as we cover those topics and have mastered some of the basics. It's planned to take a few of these programs and go over them in detail at the meetings. While the chairs are not the best for handling a laptop, it is highly recommended that you bring a laptop to checkout the material presented at the meetings. If that's not possible, try to work with another member and observe what he does (and maybe offer help if appropriate). ■

## Security Sig

Well, it's official now. Mal-ware is the most secure thing on many computers and Internet sites today.

I was reading a list of big security mistakes when a very sophisticated web robot started going around. One that combats any attempt to compromise it in a very sophisticated manner.

The three lists cover places that private information has been lost because the data wasn't encrypted, sites that can be used for Cross-Site-Scripting, and banks that don't encrypt logins. Two of them are attempts to shame those sites enough that they do something.

The bot, "Spamthru", is a very complicated money making spambot that promotes a stock pump-and-dump scheme. This trojan was found by the famous malware researcher Joe Stewart of LURHQ (now owned by SECUREWORKS). It is based on spyware dating back to March but a new version was found in October.

It is much more complex than

previous spam-bots like Sober, Bobax, or Bagle. It's complexity rivals some commercial software. I guess you could call spam a business endeavor which would give the writers motivation to produce a quality product.

While there have been programs that automate sending spam before, spamthru uses some techniques that sets it apart from its predecessors. Some of the techniques listed have been used before, but a couple are brand new ideas.

#### What it does:

- opens a back door for communications to the bot network
- protects from denial of service by using P2P and a server network
- avoids detection of static text by encrypting the spam
- avoids detection of static code by regularly downloading program updates
- avoids detection of static images by randomly altering GIF files
- avoids detection of static hash values by adding random phrases
- avoids AV updates with HOST file entries \* avoids AV scans by installing it's own AV in a rootkit fashion.
- defeats partial fixes by using multiple registry keys
- keeps others off their network with a call/response authentication
- guarantees efficiency by removing other malware

#### How to protect yourself from it:

- WATCH FOR BACKDOORS by checking open ports with FPORT, TCPVIEW, or NETSTAT
- VERIFY THE REGISTRY RUN KEYS with AUTORUN, MSCONFIG, or CCLEANER
- VERIFY THE HOST FILE
- LOCK THE HOST FILE by denying write permissions or use Spybot Search & destroy
- UPDATE YOUR AV only when the above steps are taken
- USE AN IDS on an enterprise network
- WATCH AV REPORTS for an untimely shutdown

The tool X-CLEANER removes SPAMTHRU on a desktop and both

RTGuardian and G.E.M. handle enterprise networks.

I don't know whether I should be more fastinated or scared.

ers will continue to grow and take more disk space.

One solution is to delete only those folders older than three months. Chances are, if you haven't uninstalled a Windows update after three months, you won't ever do it.

Alternatively, once you've made a backup or disk image of any "\$NTUninstall" files, you can delete the files from the hard drive immediately, because you can always restore them from backups, if you need them.

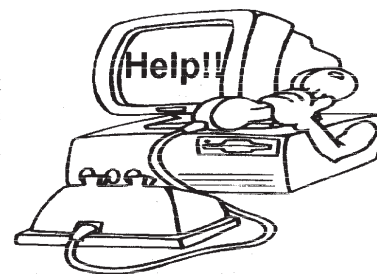
One thing Microsoft should have done is tuck these folders away in a sub-folder someplace so you don't have to scroll through them every time you want to locate something in the Windows folder. I've seen machines with over one hundred of these folders. Then again, you could always mark them as hidden.

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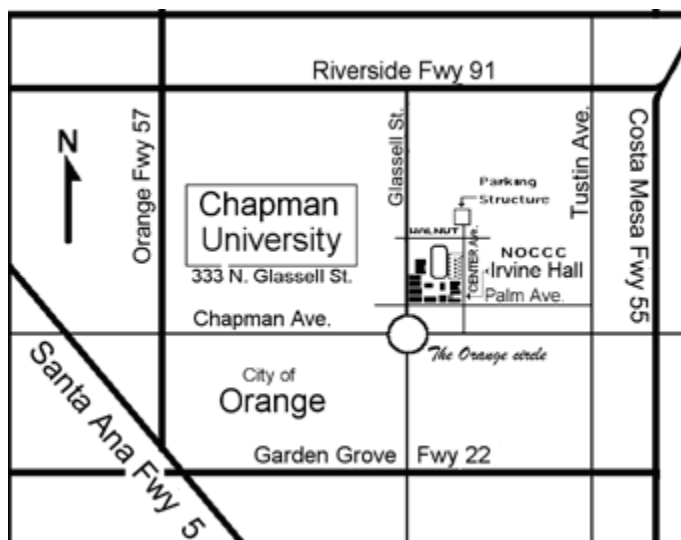
**Parking Information** — Chapman University's main parking
