As of June 2007, the Consignment Table will be set up only when eWaste will be collected, now planned for January, March, June and September. For more information, see the page 8 of the June 2007 Orange Bytes.

- The consignment table is for members only. Only current members can place items for sale, but non-members are welcome to purchase items from the table. This is a great place to get some money for your surplus computer items, and help your Club at the same time.
- The consignment table operates on a 90/10% basis — with the owner getting 90%, and the Club treasury 10%.
- 3) **Fill out a tag and attach it to each item.** Each must contain:
  - ] Seller's name
  - ] Seller's NOCCC membership number
  - ] Item name and a short description
  - ] Asking price
- Fill out the USER LIST with Name, Address, Phone Number, and a complete list of items and your asking prices.
- 5) All items and/or money may be picked up by the owner at any time, but MUST be picked up no later than 2 p.m. on the day of sale. Because of new California disposal laws, if you have a display or computer that doesn't sell, you must pick it up. The club has no storage room available, and cannot legally put it in the trash.
- 6) Any items and/or money not picked up by 2 p.m. will become the property of NOCCC and will be subject to disposal at the Club's discretion. As it is now illegal to put monitors or computers in the regular trash, you must agree to pick these items up if they don't sell.
- 7) NOCCC is NOT RESPONSIBLE in any way for items bought and/or sold at the Consignment Table. Each item is placed and sold on an AS-IS BASIS.

## President's Message

I don't want to try to thank everyone now because I can't possibly remember everyone in the next ten minutes (I'm writing the beginning of this article last). However, I'll single out a couple of exceptional efforts. First, Jim Sanders has produced an excellent newsletter for the past couple of years. And, Ted Littman has built a formidable product review and raffle prize program.

We are starting NOCCC's year 100000 (binary for 32). Over the past three decades, our membership level has changed dramatically. At the peak, there were over 1,600 members. Currently, we are about one-sixth of the peak membership. The point is the reduced membership means now everyone must help carry the load.

June's election may have seemed uneventful to most of you. However, it was not. There were many positions that are still unfilled. A large organization cannot function with essential positions vacant.

A volunteer is needed to be Secretary. This essential position is the least demanding of all the officers of the club. The secretary's job requires regular attendance at the NOCCC Board Meetings (2.5 hours), note taking, and emailing the minutes to the editor. A qualified candidate is anyone who has taken notes (as any student does), has email, and can stay awake at the Board Meeting. That's less than four hours per month.

Volunteers are needed to form a Membership Committee. The committee will promote NOCCC and increase membership. The committee will collect and create concrete ideas and execute them. That's only a few hours per month.

Volunteers are needed to help with Opening and/or Closing. The audio equipment must be set up (at 8:30 a.m.), repacked (before 4 p.m.), and returned to the local storage facility (or your home) at each meeting. We need several extemporaneous volunteers to help at Irvine Hall each month. More critically, a regular volunteer is needed to transport about half a dozen items to/from storage. Someone also needs to make the coffee before each meeting. That's less than two hours per month.

A volunteer is needed to write the report each month for the Main Meeting. I'll take a moment here to thank Eric Saca for the outstanding job he has done in writing the monthly report for almost a decade. And, Eric also was the opening and closing volunteer for years.

The Orange Bytes requires the most effort. Volunteers are needed for all functions of a publication. These include writers, proofreaders, fact checkers, desktop publishers (formats document in Adobe InDesign or Microsoft Word), mailers, etc. The total hours per month are rather large, but a large number of volunteers can reduce the burden on any one individual. To start the publication process, everyone must write for the Orange Bytes. Every member has experiences that might be worth many hours or many dollars for another. Each year, the Orange Bytes publishes the equivalent of more than one article per member. Ideally, we would publish more content that is original and improve the quality of the Orange Bytes. Depending upon content, an article might require an hour to finish or more than ten hours. That's only a few hours per month.


Volunteers are needed to staff the NOCCC booth at the ACP Swap Meet (www.acpswapmeetbyhyperactive.com). This is a good opportunity to attract new members and promote the next month's meeting topic.

A volunteer is needed to get presenters for the Main Meeting. This requires imagination and a salesman's personality. Presenters are hard to come by. User group meetings do not receive as much attention as in the past. Additionally, major vendors require large audiences (at least 100 people). Leisure World has 600 people attend each meeting, and vendors beg to be presenters.

In order for our Main Meeting to meet this requirement, we will need to double the average monthly attendance. Therefore, I propose we have *Bring a Friend Month* (on even numbered months). Everyone who "regularly" attends the Main Meeting must bring a new person to the meeting. As the quality of the presenter improves, the attendance at the meetings will improve, and it will be easier to get quality presenters.

I'll repeat it again. The success of NOCCC depends upon you to give your one hour per week.

# What the Heck Is NAS?

If you have ever wondered what this acronym is for, I will try to explain its use and function. To begin with, it stands for **Network Attached Storage**. If you are running a network or accessing the Internet through a router, you might want to consider this as an alternative HD storage in lieu of your PC or as extra storage for your laptop.

I have just completed installing one on my router and it is a wonderful place to do back ups, download files to store, and even access them over the Internet from a remote location.

In doing the research for my own installation, I had to learn many new computer terms that I wasn't familiar with. Thank god for *Google*. The first term I ran into was UPnP (**Universal Plug 'n Play**). This technology extends the Plug and Play to simplify the networking of intelligent devices in homes and businesses. When devices incorporating UPnP are physically connected to the network, they'll connect automatically to one another over the network, without the need for user configuration. This will have to be turned on, because by default Windows XP installs it but leaves it set to off.

I looked at many different NAS enclosures before deciding on a D-Link DNS-323. It has dual bays for internal 3.5" SATA Hard disks. It requires WIN XP SP2 or WIN 2000 SP6, 1 GHz processor, 200MB disk space, CD-ROM drive and IE 6 or Firefox1 or above. The box contains the Storage Enclosure, a CD-ROM w/manual and search software that you use to configure your setup, power adaptor, and a CAT5 Ethernet Cable.

In my case, I chose two 500GB Seagate Hard Drives to install. It went very smooth; the front cover slides up <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" and then lifts off. The drives slide into upper and lower channels and the drive connectors mate with built-in receptacles in the rear of the case. The cover, which has springs to hold the drives in position, is placed into the locking slots and then slid down to finish locking it place.

The next step was to connect the power adaptor from the wall outlet, or bus bar to the rear of the case, then the Ethernet cable from the NAS to the Router or Switch. By the way, in the rear of the case is a USB port for connecting a printer, making the printer network accessible.

The next step was to turn the power on and place the software disk in the CD drive and using the Easy Search Utility to search for the new device. I kept getting a no find or blank screen, oh oh. In tracking down the problem, my firewall was blocking the signal from the NAS device. Opening up the firewall, Easy Search program popped right up with the Storage Device. The DNS-323 will be assigned an IP address via DHCP. Highlighting the DNS-323 permitted me to access the configuration button and set up the disks. You are then presented with four configuration possibilities:

- 1) Standard
- 2) JBOD
- 3) RAID-0
- 4) RAID-1

I figured that Standard was formatting each drive independently, so that you would end up with two network drives, which was right on. 2, 3 and 4, what were they going to do? Going back to Google I found out that No. 2 JBOD (Just a Bunch of Disks) I would end up with one drive indicating 1TB of storage. No. 3 RAID-0 would format as one drive 500GB and when writing would put one half of the write on one drive and the other half the other drive, this is called STRIPING. The advantage is very fast reads, from the disk. No 4. RAID-1 configures each drive separately but only one visible location, with a duplicate write on the second drive, which is called MIRRORING. This is an ultra safe way to go, if one drive fails, the data is still intact on the other drive.

I chose the standard formatting and it took a total of an hour and a half to do both drives. You are warned that any data left on the drives will be destroyed, as the formatting is not compatible with FAT 32 or NTFS. The next step was to MAP the drives, the software lists all the drive letters that are available to pick from. I chose M and N. Now when I go to Windows Explorer I am presented with all the drives including C, D, E, F, G, I, M, N, & W.

### To Enable the UPnP User Interface

1. Click Start, Click Control Panel, then Click Add or Remove Programs.

 In the Add or Remove Programs dialog box, click Add/Remove Windows Components.

 In the Windows Components Wizard, click Networking Services, click Details, and then select Universal Plug and Play check box.

 Click OK, and then click Next in the Windows Component Wizard. You may need to provide your Windows XP Installation CD.

# Secure Your Flash Drive Cap

Have you ever misplaced your flash drive cap? No need to ever do that again. Secure it with a button. You will need: —a shirt button.

- -some heavy thread such as carpet thread,
- -double sided self-sticking adhesive mounting foam,
- —double sided sticky tape, and
- -some colorless nail polish.
- 1. Run the thread diagonally through two of the buttonholes and secure with a square knot.
- 2. Place the knot on the top of the button not on the flat bottom of the button.
- 3. Cut the thread long enough to secure it with enough play to remove the cap.
- 4. Cut a small piece of the double-sided self-sticking adhesive mounting foam about the size of the button.
- 5. Remove the backing from one side of the double-sided selfsticking adhesive mounting foam and place a small piece of the double-sided sticky tape on the sticky side of the double-sided self-sticking adhesive mounting foam. (The double-sided selfsticking adhesive mounting foam does not hold well without the sticky tape. The tape alone does not hold well either.)
- 6. Securely attach the flat side of the button to the sticky tape.
- 7. Trim the excess tape and foam using an xacto knife.
- 8. Remove the backing from the other side of the double-sided self-sticking adhesive mounting foam and place another piece of double sided sticky tape on the foam.
- 9. Securely attach the button foam and tape to the flash drive cap.
- 10. Secure the other end of the thread to the flash drive or lanyard. 11. Leave enough play to easily remove the cap, but not get
- 11. Leave enough play to easily remove the cap, but not get tangled.
- 12. Use the colorless nail polish to secure the knots so they don't become undone.
- 13. After the nail polish dries, trim the thread.

#### OR

You could go to your local photo shop and buy a \$2+ buttonsize lens cap keeper (or cap retainer) and modify it as needed. Most of them appear to come with elastic bands that are placed around the lens barrel as opposed to a leash that can be attached to another part of the camera.

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

## Self-Service Linux: Mastering the Art of Problem Determination

To quote the book: "In a nutshell, this book is about effectively and efficiently diagnosing problems that occur in the Linux environment." The main audience is Linux professionals, particularly programmers and support staff. There is very useful



information for skilled non-programmers in the first (Best Practices and Initial Investigation) and third (The /proc Filesystem) chapters, but the rest is for people who know their way around the x86 architecture.

The procedural suggestions for investigation are excellent for newcomers and programmers alike. The suggested sequence (observation, strace, stack inspection, recompiling and debugging) are well written. In searching the internet, they suggest Bugzilla, joining mailing lists, specific Linux sites, and Google Groups besides the usual Google firehose.

The book wisely begins by urging you to install the tools! It proceeds to outline Four Phases of a debugging procedure: Investigation with your own skills, Internet Searches, Problem Investigation Practices (keeping a log and the proper type of information), and Getting Help (or new ideas). It also makes the excellent suggestion of keeping your configuration files in a versioning system like CVS, something that everyone decides to do but usually not until some disaster has occurred. (The book does not explicitly mention that this gives you the ability to make small changes to your system too and easily revert to previous versions if the change does not work.)

The remainder of the book is split between deeper information on tools used to investigate problems (strace, Gnu DeBugger, Data Display Debugger, Kernel debugger and techniques for using them), details on how a Linux system works (The /proc Filesystem, Compiling, The Stack, the Executable and Linking Format, and in particular techniques for examining Linux crashes.

The GDB chapter was excellent, including details on how it handles inline functions and how to discover the correct way of handling exceptions. The book examples use C++. This is the best choice because the Linux kernel is written in C and many Open Source programs are written in C++. The GDB chapter ends with an introduction to the Data Display Debugger, a new graphical front-end to GDB which is able to display graphic representations of data structures.

The chapter on Linux System Crashes and Hangs distinguishes steps for 'crashes' (where the kernel actually has a chance to act before shutting down) and 'hangs' (resource contention that the kernel cannot respond). This chapter is like an encapsulation of the book: observation techniques first with an emphasis on syslog, and then adds instructions for setting up a Serial Console when the syslog fails, assisted by hotkeys, using kernel dumps, and adding kernel traps to gather additional information. Additional steps for distinguishing between hardware and software failures are given. A separate chapter is devoted to the Kernel Debugger, KDB. It is a short chapter and could have been rolled into Crashes and Hangs, but that is a minor detail.

Flaws with the book are typical for the genre. Some terms are used before they are introduced, like the SIGILL, SIGSEGV, and SIGBUS signals. Another common problem is technology as a moving target: Sun's dtrace is being ported to Linux, so there cannot be any information on it in this book.

More important is the lack of information on how to run a stable kernel and a test kernel on the same machine. This information can be found on the Internet, but it would have been great to have it here.

Finally, the book provides a collection of information on tools and techniques available in one volume that developers and maintenance staff can use in discovering subtle system problems.

The merchandise was all used equipment donated by NOCCC members. The club felt it was prudent to offer the best of this equipment to prospective buyers who could put it to use -rather than discard it as eWaste and let it be destroyed. A good deal of the equipment was workable and in good shape! Anyone interested in perusing it should contact Bill at (714) 348-7989 or Gordon Eng at (562) 627-1910.

Proceeds from equipment sales would benefit the club. Gerry also mentioned that the club installs a legitimate copy of Windows XP on each computer system, purchased from Microsoft at about \$20 - 25 dollars -- the price for nonprofit user groups. He said another eWaste collection event would occur in about 3 or 4 months. If anyone wanted to get rid of eWaste before then, they could bring it to the club Computer Store in Santa Ana. Herb Wong, the new President-Elect, gave a brief plea for more volunteers -- especially for the recently vacated, crucial position of Newsletter Editor. Without a Newsletter Editor, there would be no Orange Bytes.

Herb also asked for a round of applause to thank the outgoing officers, directors -- and Newsletter Editor, Jim Sanders -- for all their dedicated service.

About the open Newsletter Editor position, Jim Sanders suggested that any interested volunteers would not be forced to use Adobe InDesign, previously used for the Bytes. To bypass that learning curve, volunteers could use a product they were familiar with, like simple Microsoft Word. He was willing to help with that.

Jim then began his Google presentation. It covered information from very helpful FREE PowerPoint presentations offered by a past NOCCC presenter -- Patrick Crispen. They are all on his website at

www.netsquirrel.com/powerpoint/internet.html, listed as Google 101, Google 201, and Google 301. There are also many more helpful PowerPoints on his site, accessible at www.netsquirrel.com/powerpoint.

Jim started off discussing the confusion people seem to have between search terms and Internet addresses (URLs). There is a keyword research tool called Word Tracker www.wordtracker.com that lists the top keywords used in web search sites at any given time. Keywords that often appear in the top 15 are Google, eBay, Yahoo, and Mapquest.

This suggests that people are entering URLs as search terms instead of putting them where they belong -- the Address bars of their web browsers. It is unnecessary to ever enter URLs as keywords if you simply want to go to those sites.

Jim suggested entering questions as search terms. (The question mark isn't needed at the end and capitalization isn't important, as Google is not case-sensitive.) To demonstrate, Jim entered the question, "what is the population of iraq". There were over 32 million results, but the first one clearly displayed, "Population: 27,499,638 (July 2007 est.)."

Next, he typed "where is bulgaria". Google intelligently responded with "Location: Southeastern Europe, bordering the Black Sea, between Romania and Turkey" (and over 15 million links).

Despite popular myth, there is not a limit of just ten words in the search term. Google had increased the limit to 32 words. However, it's advisable not to enter more than ten.

Jim then refined his search with the *Search within Results* link. He re-entered the Iraq question, then clicked Search within Results. Another search field appeared. He entered "over 50" and clicked the Search within Results button. This produced over 4 million results (a great reduction from 32 million). However, the number of Iraqis over 50 years old was not immediately evident.

When searching for a phrase instead of individual words, the complete phrase must be put in quotes. Jim demonstrated this by doing the previous search again, putting the "over 50" in quotes before clicking Search Within Results. This narrowed the outcome to 626,000 results.

Jim briefly discussed how Google \*probably\* works, as explained by Patrick Crispen. It involves Patrick's PageRank Algorithm, detailed in slides 4-16 of the Google 201 PowerPoint file.

He explained Google's Weather function. To get the weather for a particular location, you can just type "weather" (without the quotes) and the city and state or just the zip code. For instance, "weather orange, ca" (without quotes) will display the current weather in Orange and a four-day forecast. Also, "weather 92866" (without quotes) will produce the same results.

He explained Google's Movie function, "movie:" (without quotes, as all keywords must be entered from this point forward, unless otherwise specified). Using a location, you can find the movies and their showtimes for all theaters around that location. For instance, "movie: orange, ca" will list all movies in theaters in Orange and surrounding cities. Also, "movie: 92866" will produce the same results. If you are interested in a specific movie, you can specify it for detailed information and reviews, e.g., "movie: pirates."

Jim pointed out that with Google, you no longer need a cookbook. There is a complete Google Recipes section. To get there, just enter keywords like "french recipe". In the resulting page, Google will offer a link saying, "Find results for french recipe in Recipes search." Click that link and you will be in the Google Recipes page, where you can look for recipes based on very specific criteria, such as Meal Type, Course, and Main Ingredient.

Gerry Resch asked if there was a trick to changing to a specific page of Google's search results, such as the 24th. Jim had not seen a Google feature for doing so, apart from the short list of numbers at the bottom of the results screen. He suggested changing the resulting URL in the Address bar.

Specifically, Jim changed the "start=" part of the URL, which specifies the result number (not the page number) in the list. He entered a search and Google produced the first page. The "start=" part of the URL did not appear on the first page, so Jim clicked to the second page, where the URL included "start=10" (since there are ten results per page and the first result in any search is numbered 0).

Next, Jim changed the URL to specify "start=5000". This produced a blank page with an error message stating, "Sorry, Google does not serve more than 1000 results for any query." Therefore, Jim changed the URL again to specify "start=999." This produced a page with the very last result from his search.

Jim then introduced us to *Google Music Trends* at www.google.com/trends/music. Using it involves downloading and installing a program and configuring your system. (Obviously, you need a sound system to make effective use of the site.) To learn more, there is a link on the www.google.com/trends/music page -- Participate in Music Trends.

As Jim already had his system set up, he demonstrated the great usefulness of Google Music Trends. He launched it and entered an artist's name in the search bar: Floyd Cramer. Google then listed all of Floyd's albums with information about each one, including the artist, release date, and a list of songs. Jim

demonstrated that you can download individual songs as well as thumbnail pictures of album covers.

Jim briefly covered the Google Books section, in which you can search for keywords in books. To get there, he clicked the More link at the top of the main screen, then Books. To find a term in a book, you first search for the book itself, perhaps by title. Then when it's found, you perform another search for the keyword.

Since books include copyrighted material, you only get brief sections displaying your keywords and the surrounding text. Typically, you also will not get all occurrences of the word. That's because you only get sample pages from the book, not the whole volume. (Google may provide some entire books for download, particularly those in the public domain, but typically this is not the case.)

At this point, Jim reminded us that for PDF books, Adobe Acrobat Reader can read them to you out loud (assuming you have a sound system). You can use this feature to read a book while doing other things, in the same way you would use an audio book (although its computer voice may not be ideal). To have Acrobat Reader read to you, click View > Read Out Loud.

He demonstrated by opening a PDF of a past Bytes issue. He had Acrobat Reader read some of the President's Message from Cathy Margolin (president during that issue).

Jim then went to Google Video, from a link at the top of Google's main page. He commented that Google recently bought YouTube, so the Videos site is obviously powered by YouTube. In the search box, Jim entered "new york video". Several links came up and Jim displayed a couple of the videos. One was a New York weather report from a news program. The other was a music video showing scenes of New York City.

He next showed us how to filter out search results with the minus sign (-). For example, he wanted results from the pirates search, but without any references to Disney. Thus, he entered "pirates -disney" in the search box. It produced the same results, but without the "Pirates of the Caribbean" links previously shown.

Jim demonstrated Google Earth (http://earth.google.com), where you can see satellite photos of places around the globe. You can also use it to zoom in on specific places, seeing detailed views of buildings. This requires a program download.

There is also a new Google Mars site (http://mars.google.com) -- not requiring a separate download. (However, it is not as detailed, either.)

To get help with Google and learn even more about it, you can click the About Google link, then click Help. (This gets you to www.google.com/support.)

There is a Google for Educators --

www.google.com/educators. There is a Google Labs site, with links to many interesting and useful Google pages and features -labs.google.com. Google offers simple games -- available by entering "games" in the search box, then when the results appear, clicking the "Free Games on Google" link.

It also offers Gmail, a free e-mail service like Yahoo and Hotmail. Someone commented that Gmail now allows users to send attachments up to 20 megabytes in size. Elise went up to demonstrate her own customized Google page. She clicked the Sign In link at the top of the main page, then entered her credentials. It brought up a page displaying "iGoogle" at the top, instead of "Google." It displayed the local weather in Orange, CA, as well as links that Elise had set up herself -- including those to her favorite games.



He suggested that it would benefit everyone to make time to explore Google on their own.




Herb Wong, left, the President Elect with outgoing President Elise Edgell.



## **AmiBroker SIG**

This session was devoted to trading systems and reviewing AFL code. A package of 40+ programs was made available for downloading to the members signed up on the website, AFL-Tidbits. The main value of the code was to provide material to learn from - by reading it, getting an understanding of what the code is doing, looking up functions in the manual or help screens to understand how the functions are being used and what they do, and looking at the variation in coding styles, some good, some poor and confusing which is a lesson itself in neatness, organization, change management, and documentation. All this stuff is old hat to an experienced programmer, and they should not have any trouble going through this to glean the good parts from the package. Non-programmers should learn that many of these things are tedious, but as important as the coding itself. We started with an example program that was well documented and provided the basis for a trading system – except the trading model itself didn't make you much money. It's up to you to add your own model - no one is going to hand you the Holy Grail. The ideas have to come from you. From those who have been MetaStock users, you have experienced this already. That program comes with hundreds of trading strategies, and you can download thousands more from websites, but most of them won't make you rich. You can also buy expensive plug-in packages, but don't expect to become an expert by doing so.

You will come across programs that can do things that you can use in your analysis. I spend a lot of time checking Yahoo-Groups, FT-Talk, and AmibrokerFan for codes that I can put to use – usually as chunks of code that accomplish something that you didn't think of, or didn't know how to do. Saving these Tidbits in a coding library makes them accessible and helps to get over coding dilemmas. The key is to learn enough about the code so you can build a new program from an old one, changing features to those you want, and re-using proven code when possible to be more productive.

Some members brought in their laptops and got help with specific questions and problems with AmiBroker. There was a Wi-Fi signal present so they could do some downloads too.

**Next month** – we'll look at how to process industry-sector data and make it available in plots and explorations. This primarily applies to those using Quotes-Plus or TC2000 as a data source that provides sector data.

## **Computer Aided Investing SIG**

Market Review: The month of May was a very good one to be in the market. It makes it tough for those who listened to all the "worry" about being over-bought and at all time highs on the Dow and S&P500. We came to the conclusion last month that it pays to follow the trend and the trend continues up. Some technical indicators are showing patterns of weakness, such as the McClellan Summation Index with lower highs, but it hasn't signaled time to bailout. Top sectors are in the Latin America, Brazil and Emerging Market funds with Energy and Telecom showing some strength. The only market segments not rising were gold and the US Dollar. Small Caps were not as strong as the Mid Cap and Large Caps, indicating investor interest in keeping their money in less risky securities. Listening to the gurus does not paint a clear picture, but there are still more bears than bulls and that outlook seems to hold for a few more months. Signals from Vector Vest, Tango5 and many from the FastTrack/Trade community are on buys. So this year maybe we don't follow the rule "Sell in May and Go Away," but continue to follow our disciplines, trust our systems and watch the green roll in. If you haven't set up your system yet, maybe you haven't attended enough of our meetings.

Discussion: The subject was economics and bear markets, and what signs should we look for to tell us of a bear market. Unfortunately, most economic cause and effects cannot be used like technical indicators to explain changes in a stock's price and volume. But a cause and effect chart was presented to show the factors involved in how consumer spending is at the heart of the economy and that the stock market is affected when spending trends change. The information is from www.aheadofthecurvethebook.com, which contains many charts from the book of the same title by Joe Ellis. He explains the main points of the chart and through deduction shows that bear markets begin when consumer spending drops from peaks, and a recession following within a year or two. So are we headed this way now? Not quite. Since corporate earnings have been so strong, spending has not turned down, even with problems in housing and higher energy and other costs.

**Presentation:** This time we watched a video about using the ideas and styles of some of the famous investing gurus. This is all part of a company, Validea.com that uses them in putting together stock portfolios that follow each of the guru's ideas, or blending the best ideas together. The portfolios are available as a subscription service. However, similar information is available from the same gurus from AAII and the stock screens on their website, AAII.com. Some of the experts include: Ben Graham, Martin Zweig, Ken Fisher, James O'Shaughnessy, Peter Lynch, William O'Neil, Joseph Piotroski, John Neff, and of course Warren Buffett. These portfolios typically outperform the S&P500 by 2-4 times. Looking at what's involved may be more than an individual would want to do single-handed - holding up to 50 stocks with monthly turnover ranging from 20% -to-47% and coping with losses or drawdowns up to 25%. AAII provides screens for following these portfolios as part of their Stock Investor Pro software package (\$198 for members).

At the June meeting, the slideshow-driven meeting idea generated enough questions that the topics of the Tall-Pod and white balance filled the entire meeting.

#### **Fireworks and Outdoor Portraits**

For the July meeting I hope some of you members will bring some pictures you would like us to see. We can display files from CD, DVD, thumb drives, and most types of memory cards.

Since this will be the first time in ages that the July meeting will occur before the Forth of July; Fireworks and Outdoor Portraits struck me as a good topic.

#### Fireworks

Only a tiny overview of the topic is covered here. You must come to the meeting to get the complete picture.

From a photographic perspective fireworks have the advantage that people won't notice most of the problems caused by camera shake or improper exposure. This is good because taking photos of unpredictable high speed exploding incendiaries against a night sky offers a variety of challenges.

• Very few cameras can focus automatically on fireworks. Unless you pre-focus manually, your pictures will probably be out of focus.

• The contrast is extremely high and I have yet to see a metering system that can give reliable exposure. Unless you take precautions your pictures will be over exposed and lack color.

• You frequently have to predict the time, location and size of the bursts. This requires good reflexes and a steady hand. Also, watch for rising trails.

The downside to all of this is that you will need to set everything possible on your camera to manual,

especially the focus. My first digital camera had no manual settings at all and never delivered a single useable photo of fireworks in three years, even though I had learned to trick many of the automatic settings. Some cameras have special function icons like sunsets or portraits which work very well, and I keep hoping to see a camera with a fireworks setting. If you have such a camera please let me know how it works.

As to the contrast, only about 5% of the pixels in a fireworks photo are subject mater and they represent white hot incendiary matter. The other 95% of the pixels are of black sky.

This histogram is typical of fireworks. Only a tiny image portion of the pixels require some skill to balance between the over exposed parts and the dark sky. Too far one way



and you get black; too far the other and you get white. However, it's worth the effort to learn how and not too difficult. With better

cameras and improved software, I expect to have even better samples by the meeting. In the meantime, try an exposure of ISO 100, and f 8 at 1/8". The ISO controls the noise; the f 8 controls the depth of field and the exposure, while the 1/8" controls the length of the streaks.

Although no light meter will work, none is required since the brightness of fireworks is fairly constant. After a few shots you may decide to make some adjustments of your own.

The below photo used a shutter speed of 0.4 seconds to enhance the smoke and the aperture was set to f 4 keeping the same total exposure of about E.V. 8. I favor shutter speeds between .1 and 0.5 seconds although I'm experimenting with using bulb (about 30-45 seconds) with a wide-angle lens for the show finale.

To predict where the bursts will be, watch for launch trails in the sky. Also set your zoom to wider angles and then zoom in towards the expanding bursts if desired.

Try taking some pictures of fireworks. You should get some you like and if not, erasing the digital files costs nothing.

#### **Outdoor Portraits**

Jack Donan sent me a PDF file titled "Shoot Better Outdoor

Portraits" by Mason Resnick from Adorama Imaging Resource Center. This file will be used as the template for the second portion of the SIG. It wouldn't be 4<sup>th</sup> of July without outdoor portraits; and Mason Resnick will show us how to avoid such problems as



"Raccoon Eyes," harsh sunlight, dark faces w/ light backgrounds, and much more.
