Security Tidbits

Symantec's Annual Report

Symantec Inc. recently came out with their report on the state of cyber security. I haven't read all 109 pages yet, but I have read the 38 page summary and a write-up on it at SANS.ORG. I'll try to summarize the summary here.

What Are You Worth?

You are worth less than 0.67% of your bank account (about 0.667 percent to be as exact). The report included a price list of popular items for sale on the virtual underground:

Bank accounts.....	\$10 - \$1000
Credit cards.....	\$0.40 - \$20
Full identities.....	\$1 - \$15
eBay accounts.....	\$1 - \$8
Hosting a scam	\$2.5 - \$50/week
Designing a scam.....	\$25
Email addresses.....	\$0.83/MB - \$10/MB
Email passwords.....	\$4 - \$30

In other words, your bank account can go for as much as \$1000 while your identity is only worth \$15 at most. Actually, while the bad guys can get the high prices for well known identities, the rest of us are usually sold in bulk.

Active-X Is King Of Plug-In Vulnerabilities

Many people don't accept the idea that Active-X is more dangerous than anything else that plugs into your browser. Not only does theory tell me otherwise (Active-X has more permissions to do more and wreak more havoc than anything else) but history seems to prove the detractors wrong. Here are the exact figures for January-June 2007. The numbers for July-December are very similar except it added Windows Media Player and dropped Mozilla extensions.

A comparison of the vulnerabilities used in 2007:

Active-X.....	89.9%
Quick Time.....	8.0%
Java.....	2.0%
Mozilla extensions.....	1.0%
Acrobat.....	1.0%

Phishing Is More Popular

From the second half of 2006 to the second half of 2007, there was a 559% increase in the number of web-sites that "hosted" at least one phishing scheme.

Some Things Haven't Changed

One thought that was the same in the Symantec 2006 report and their 2007 report was the fact that malicious software was becoming much more professional and was being marketed like commercial software from a legit company. They used the techniques like multi-tiered pricing and adaptive business

models to quickly react to marketing forces such as supply-and-demand.

The Most Dangerous Area On The Internet

Peru. I have to admit, if pushed for an uninformed opinion, I would probably discriminate against Russia, eastern Europe, or a former member of the Soviet Union.

These tidbits are from the first dozen pages of the summary only and more exist but dinner is waiting. Sorry!

WordPad

If you don't have the "full-feature" Word program, Microsoft's Windows operating systems include a pretty good free alternative. You can open it by clicking *Start – All Programs – Accessories – WordPad*. (The simpler text editor, NotePad is located in Accessories too.) Scott Dunn provides some tips on using WordPad (p. 133) as well as a link to a free spell-checker to use with WordPad which doesn't contain one (<http://find.pcworld.com/59243>).

Jarte Word Processor

Another suggestion (from Laura Blackwell, p. 88, <http://find.pcworld.com/59265>) is to download this free portable word processor (WordPad with "bells and whistles") from Carolina Road Software. It is small enough to fit onto a 64mb thumb drive – great for travelers who do not have Internet access for using free online word processors.

Improving Your Digital Photos

Dave Johnson's article (p. 134) tells you how to fix color balance, correct exposure, and straighten verticals using a photoeditor like Photoshop Elements.

Easy Capture

This screen-capture software allows to capture screen images in a variety of sizes and formats and it has some extra functions

that are surprising for a free program (p. 88, by Laura Blackwell, <http://find.pcworld.com/59257>).

Google's Advanced Search

Scott Spanbauer has an excellent article (p. 128) on using the advanced search feature of the Google browser for saving time and effort in finding what you are looking for on-line without having to scan through a zillion hits. He even gives specific examples to make the process easier to understand.

Fight Identity Theft

One way to monitor charges to your credit cards and transactions in other financial accounts is to request each institution to send you regular emails on the status of your accounts (i.e., amounts owed on credit cards, withdrawals over a certain amount from checking/savings accounts, etc.) Of course, you do need to establish password-protected on-line accounts with your financial services companies and set up criteria for notification. Erik Larkin (p. 54) writes about a new, free aggregating Web service (www.mint.com) that can keep track of all your financial accounts and send you alerts when specific thresholds are exceeded (<http://find.pcworld.com/59303>).

Laptops

Ten models, some with prices under \$1500, are rated on p. 73 (<http://find.pcworld.com/55176>). The 15.4-in. Acer Aspire 5920G at \$1999 is a Best Buy followed by the 17-in. Dell Inspiron 1720 at \$2184. If you are in the market for a laptop, also take a look at PC Magazine's ratings at <http://www.pcmag.com/category2/0,2806,9,00.asp>.

Flat-Screen LCD Monitors

PCW tested 17 mid-range priced wide screens in 3 size categories (19-in., 20/22-in., 25.5/28-in.) and provides ratings along with a discussion of the results (p. 117 – 124). In-depth reviews are posted at <http://find.pcworld.com/59424>. Top-rated among the largest size units is a Best Buy Samsung SyncMaster 275T at \$1000. In the mid-range category, the 20.1-in. HP w2007 was a Best Buy at \$260, but the same-score Samsung SyncMaster 205BW is only \$239.

GPS Devices

The top-five rated models for in-car use include the Best Buy Garmin Nuvi 360 with a 3.5-in. screen at \$413 (p. 60 -62, <http://find.pcworld.com/59221>).

Portable Solar Charger

PCW likes the new, but expensive Powermonkey-eXplorer (\$130 street price) solar charger for use with many hand-held gadgets like cell phones, iPods, etc. It uses a 5-volt DC folding solar panel and lithium ion battery and comes with a variety of plug adapters, including USB. More details are at <http://find.pcworld.com/59273>.

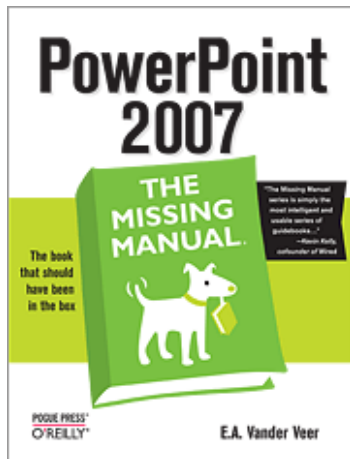

PowerPoint 2007 The Missing Manual

Summary: In PowerPoint 2007 The Missing Manual, author E.A. Vander Veer presents a comprehensive view of PowerPoint 2007. She gives practical tips and some common sense advice for both creating and giving presentations, many of which work in earlier versions of PowerPoint. Her writing style makes for fairly easy reading. One of the techniques she uses is to introduce concepts followed by step-by-step instructions, a very useful teaching technique.



A 16-page introduction discusses new features for PowerPoint 2007, such as the ribbon, a multi-tabbed toolbar that replaces the previous menus for commands. Rather than going into deep detail in the Introduction Vander Veer gives enough information about the ribbon to allow the user to get started. Details are given throughout the book. The ribbon is something that will make learning Office products easier for new users, but requires users who are familiar with earlier versions to relearn where commands are stored.

New graphics, templates, and the reduced ability to collaborate are also introduced. There also is a comparison of the new file formats vs. the older formats, and the beginning of her hints for using PowerPoint as a tool. One of the many reasons I like the book is because I agree with many of her ideas, such as "PowerPoint is supposed to support your presentation, not be your presentation" and "just because you can, doesn't mean that you should."

The 30 pages of Chapter One introduce creating slides from scratch, using templates and themes, and it introduces speaker notes and handouts. Throughout the book the author uses a technique common in commercial (versus academic) training classes: she discusses a concept and then gives step-by-step instructions to accomplish the task. It is a technique that can make learning easier.

The Introduction and Chapter One give users enough information to create basic slides. The next fourteen chapters go into the details of creating more effective slides by modifying text; adding charts, diagrams, and tables; printing slides, handouts, overheads, and speaker notes; adding images, sound, and video; creating transitions and animating slide objects; creating slide masters and layout masters (which are new); and more.

Some areas receive more attention than I expected. It is unusual, if not unique, for a PowerPoint book -- or even an Excel book -- to suggest which type of chart to use based on the type of data and what the presenter wants to convey. The discussion in The Missing Manual is no match for a dedicated book such as *How to Lie with Charts*, but it does have more to offer than the majority of Office books. As usual, remember that such discussions often are based on opinions. Vander Veer also points out that the available chart styles and the creation techniques depend on whether the user has Excel loaded. If so, Excel can be used to create charts; if not, PowerPoint falls back on default Microsoft Graph, the "old way" of PowerPoint charting.

The author also gives more attention to the drawing toolbar than I expected, possibly because they are often used more in PowerPoint than in other programs. I know a number of people who use PowerPoint for its graphic abilities; they don't give presentations, they print the slides.

On the inside of the back cover of The Missing Manual is the statement "There's no CD-ROM with this book; you just saved \$5.00." However, there is a Web link to <http://www.missingmanuals.com> for shareware and additional information, including indirect links to Microsoft tutorials.

Although there are books written specifically for new users that may be better introductions, I can recommend this book to both new users (O'Reilly also publishes a "For Starters" book by E.A. Vander Veer, list price is \$20, but discounted, see: <http://www.oreilly.com/catalog/9780596528317/index.html>), and to more experienced users who want to get up to speed in PowerPoint 2007 quickly and easily. There is plenty of information in this book for reference, and it is written in such a way that it makes for a good training tool. That, plus the links make this a worthwhile book, especially if one takes advantage of the publisher's discount.

Main Meeting Report

Steve Gibson at the April 2008 Main Meeting

Since it was the 32nd anniversary meeting of the NOCCC, we had a short talk about the club's history by Larry McDavid, Member #2. In April 1976 Lauren Moeller (Member #1), Tracy Lenocker, and McDavid started the club at California State University, Fullerton. We are still the second oldest computer club in the country.

Steve Gibson, President of Gibson Research Corp., was our speaker. He is the author of SpinRite 6, ShieldsUp and many other useful utilities to keep your data secure. Check their web site, www.grc.com, and be prepared to be overwhelmed! He last visited the NOCCC September of 2006. Then, as now, the issue was computer security. Immediately, we could all tell that he is zealous about this issue. He said that computers and their components are unsecured too often. Laptop computers and USB flash drives can be stolen, and office PCs are left unattended. So, how should we go about protecting our data?

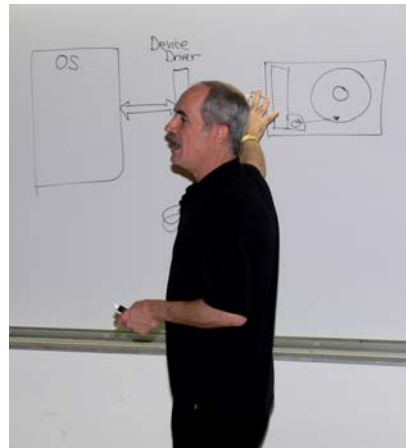


Steve Gibson, left, and Jim Sanders setting up for the meeting.

Ideally, all the data on the hard drive should be encrypted at all times. A large part of the next hour or so was spent discussing TrueCrypt, available at www.truecrypt.org. This is free, open-source encryption software that Gibson has investigated extensively. You need

administrator privileges to install it and it is good for whole hard drives, partitions, USB flash drives, other storage devices, or partitions, but not single files. TrueCrypt "creates a virtual encrypted disk within a file and mounts it as a real disk." The encrypted file that looks like noise, that is, random information on the hard drive.

Normally, the first sector of the hard drive has a boot sector that is read and executed when the PC starts. The rest of track 0 is unused, but can't be used to start a partition. TrueCrypt adds two copies of the information it needs to the rest of track 0. Then, it modifies the boot record so you must enter the password to start the PC. The new version of TrueCrypt is small, fast and uses a good method for doing the encryption. Initial encrypting of an 80 GB hard drive took about an hour. A defragmentation of a hard drive running TrueCrypt took nearly the same time as one without it.



One of the more interesting features of TrueCrypt is that it can create a hidden partition. This hides free space and you can store your most secret data there. If you are forced to give up your password, you can give up one to your "public area" where you keep less important data.

Another issue that was raised is that TrueCrypt leads the user through a

procedure for installation and encrypting of their data. The process is designed to keep the user from losing access to his/her data. Also, the TrueCrypt password must be known to all users of the PC, backups of a hard drive using TrueCrypt will not be encrypted initially, and an encrypted hard drive is still vulnerable to password guessing. However, Gibson has several solutions for that problem on his web site.

Gibson Research's web site has two password generators. One is called *Perfect Passwords*, which generates three unique passwords for each visitor to the page. The other is called *Perfect Paper Passwords*, which generates three tables of random character sets, which can be used to make a random password.



For individual files, Gibson suggested AxCrypt, which uses AES (Advanced Encryption Standard) using the Rijndael cipher available at www.axantum.com/AxCrypt.

Encryption can also be accomplished using hardware. An example Gibson mentioned was the USB flash drives made by IronKey. The data is hardware-encrypted when written to the drive. The drive becomes unusable after ten wrong tries at entering the password. As their web site, www.ironkey.com, states "IronKey's patent-pending 'flash-trash' methodology incorporates an exhaustive hardware erase of all flash and Cryptochip memory. This is not a simple clearing of file allocation tables, but a secure overwriting of data." They are available in 1, 2 and 4 GB USB flash drives, starting at \$79.

Autoplay is another unsecured aspect of computers. If enabled, any software from a USB flash drive, hard drive or other device

will run as soon as it is connected. Another hint is allowing scripting to run on trusted web sites only.

After all this information, Steve Gibson had some time left over for questions. He said if an on-line bank limits the number of characters in a password to a small number or does not allow capitals or symbols, they are behind the times security-wise and that we should consider changing banks. Keystroke loggers, an insidious type of spyware, now know about virtual keyboards, which was a tool used to thwart them for a time.



All in all, a very informative and exciting meeting!

Hardware SIG

The topic for the April 06, 2008 Hardware SIG was **Light Emitting Diode (LED) Technology**. LEDs are solid state devices that efficiently convert electricity into light.

First discovered about a century ago, an LED is a p-n junction that has characteristic charged polarities on either side of the junction. As a voltage is applied, current will flow and photons (light) are emitted. If the polarity of the voltage is reversed, the tendency of the charges is reversed, and current does not flow. Thus, current will flow in one direction only.

Depending upon the chemical composition of the diode, different frequencies of light are produced. Each specific formulation produces light in a very narrow range.

Currently, most “white” LEDs are actually blue LEDs with a phosphorescent coating that fools the human eye into seeing a relatively white light (frequently with a blue tinge). Other technologies are being introduced that will also produce white LEDs.

Do not believe the myth that LEDs will last 100,000 hours. Single color (non-white) LEDs can last an extremely long time if not abused electrically or physically (especially by over heating). However, low quality white LEDs do not last very long. High quality white LEDs will last tens of thousands of hours.

Manufacturers such as Cree, Seoul Semiconductor (SSC), Phillips LumiLEDs, Nichia, etc. produce high quality white LEDs. Unless you see these names on LED products, you should be wary of the lifespan of white LEDs. If you see a household light replacement (Edison medium or e27 socket) bulb, don't be surprised if the LEDs start failing after a matter of hours.

The latest innovation in LEDs is AC (alternating current) operation. Seoul Semiconductor's Acriche (www.acriche.com) is an example of a 120 volt AC LED. This eliminates the bulky transformer (voltage conversion) and AC to DC conversion components. With four dies, this LED can produce as much light as a 60 watt incandescent bulb.

LEDs maintain color temperature when dimmed. The built-in lens of an LED focuses the light into the desired area, greatly improving upon the incandescent light which requires a reflector to utilize a great portion of its output. The efficiency can often improve at lower current. Low operating temperatures are good, unlike fluorescent bulbs which do not like cold temperatures such as freezer cases in supermarkets.

PC Q&A SIG

We had a good SIG meeting in April. There was an unusually large number in attendance. I do understand that most of the increase was due to people showing up early to see the star attraction of the day, Steve Gibson, the main meeting speaker. Still, it was nice to see that many faces in the auditorium.

We had a number of interesting questions. Two of the questions had to do with power-line protection. As most of you know, it is recommended that, at the minimum, you plug your computer into a power outlet strip that has surge protection and of course is fused or has a circuit breaker. One additional advantage of plugging your entire computer system into a single outlet strip is that all the circuit grounds are, by definition, common. Of course that does not guarantee that the earth ground connection to the three prong outlet on the wall is actually connected to earth ground. If you live in an older house it would be a good idea to verify that the previous owner didn't simply replace the two pronged outlet with a three prong outlet for the convenience of not having to use an adapter.

I know of one person who followed good advice and purchased a good quality, surge-protected, circuit breaker outlet strip. Since he knew that the power outlet in his computer room was a 2-prong, he purchased a good quality 2-prong-to-3-prong adapter at the same time. He did not understand that the surge protection circuit cannot work unless it has a good connection to earth ground. As a result, of course, the protection that he thought he had paid for and installed did not exist.

Don Heinlein mentioned that he had picked up a small APC brand of uninterruptible power supply, AKA a UPS, at a cost of \$40.00 on sale. While the length of time that a UPS of this size can keep your computer running after the power goes away is not very long, it is frequently more than long enough. By far the

most frequent type of power problem that we have in this area is what I would call a glitch. The power doesn't go completely off, but it is enough of an interruption to cause the lights to flicker. There are two aspects to this type of glitch that are particularly bad. One is that the glitch is not quite long enough to cause computer to actually shut down but it is long enough that the required voltage to operate correctly falls below the minimum. This can cause problems on your hard disk if you happen to be writing to it at the time. The second bad attribute of this type of glitch is that it frequently has high voltage spikes on the power line that far exceed what is supposed to be there.

The point was made that a small UPS certainly has enough reserve to get you past the momentary power glitch and in addition, they frequently have a very good spike/surge protection circuit built into them. So, for not much more money than what a good, brand name, quality, surge protected outlet strip costs, you can protect your computer against two problems. Putting aside the questionable logic of spending hundreds of dollars on a computer, and then hoping to protect it with the cheapest surge outlet strip that you can find, there is a better reason for considering purchasing a name brand. On some of the Triplet brand of outlet strips, included in the price, is a \$25,000.00 insurance policy that covers the repair or replacement of equipment that is damaged when plugged into one of their units.

I have several new topics that I think are worth talking about at the next meeting, in addition to quite a bit more that can be said about Nero 8. One of those topics is the U3 USB thumb drives. See you next month.

Computer Aided Investing SIG

Market Review: April 1st was no "Fools Day" with a big market rally pushing the Dow up 391 points or 3.2% with the other major indices matching this increase. Investors rushed into the market optimistic that the worst of the credit crisis may have passed with some write downs by the big financial institutions and greater backing by the Fed. The end result of this move was to regain the losses of the prior 4 days and get back to the levels as of the beginning of March. The net result is a market in a trading range, moving sideways with a lot of volatility that nets little progress. The Gurus say that we are in for a trading range for the rest of the year and maybe several years. Near term expectations are not good, since we are entering an earnings announcements period, and corporate earnings are likely to be



down for the first quarter. The breadth is not there to support a continued rally or uptrend. Sector strength is limited to energy and materials - but much of that is due to a weak dollar. The trading signals tell us there are a few signals on buy, but they are likely to be short lived as this intermediate cycle rally will turn down. The cycles indicate a downward trend for the next 7 - 10 weeks. The technical signals to watch for include: the indexes crossing above their 200-day MA, the 50-day MA above the 200-day MA, the index above the middle Bollinger Band, and a McClellan Summation Index above zero. **With all these not present - we are in a confirmed Bear Trend.**

Presentation - High Growth Stock Investor (www.highgrowth.com): This is a data service that is built upon Quotes Plus and provides a comprehensive system for picking stocks, ETFs, and mutual funds. Each night as the QP data base is updated, the HGSI data base is updated, making new rankings of the various data groups, so you can just walk through the various screens and see what is on top. For stock pickers who are constantly looking for new prospects, this is an excellent tool. This is a very comprehensive tool for those investors who wish to look at Sector/Industry Group rankings and the breakdowns. It has screens and filters that provide selections that compare with the IBD screens, Gorilla Stocks, and with a little work, I think it could compete with Vector Vest screens and ranking too. It's easy to learn and use, and is open-ended so you can develop your own screens, rankings, and views. For those using Quotes Plus as an EOD service for AmiBroker, MetaStock, etc., the HGSI would cost about \$20 more per month, and provide a lot of screening capabilities usable by the TA programs. HDSI includes an excellent charting program tied into the screens, so you can click to a chart and browse through a ranked list, looking at the charts with a single click.

There is a large user community following HGSI on Yahoo User Groups which discusses stock picks and various uses of the software. Ian Woodward provides 3-day seminars on Stock Picking about every 6 months in Palos Verdes. To get acquainted, there is a two-month free trial available, which includes the Quotes Plus data for 2 months. This is a great deal to learn more about the system and techniques used.

Demonstration - Podcasts on Investing Using iTunes: As an avid Mac user, I've been using iTunes for my music and Internet radio, and came across podcasts category which I initially thought was just a lot of junk (similar to the internet news) With a lot of skepticism, I subscribed to a few podcasts in the Business section and found them to be of interest. So I started downloading them to my iPod and listening to these short programs when I was working around the house, in the car, at the airport, etc. The podcasts are short programs, like listening to the radio, and vary in quality and style. The "good ones" are a matter of personal choice, but there is no cost to try them except for your time. The main source I used was the iTunes Store which contains over 100 choices in the Business/Investing area.

iTunes software is available free on the Mac and PC (www.apple.com) and once installed it will permit you to access the iTunes Store which contains the podcast library. Once there you can try recent podcast sessions to see if they meet your

interests, and subscribe to them, which provides for automated downloading of the latest session when you have iTunes running. Investing subjects cover the gamut - discussing very basic concepts to detailed trading strategies using technical indicators, etc. referring to more details on the website. Some podcasts are no more than infomercials and you can cancel those subscriptions without consequences.

Next month we do not have a program planned. As SIG Leader, I am stepping down and we need a new leader to organize and conduct the CAI meetings.

AmiBroker SIG

This meeting's agenda focused on using FastTrack Signals in Amibroker. There is a wealth of knowledge in the 15+ years of trading systems using FastTrack and its related tools - FastTools, Trade, FastBreak, FastRube, etc. Many of these signals are still viable in-use, and continue to be developed by the FastTrack/Trade community. Over the years, several utilities have been developed (by Bruce Robinson) to bring the FastTrack files into AmiBroker and run trading programs using their timing systems. This allowed full use of AB's capabilities, except for optimization - since the signal was imported as data, and not logic that could be incorporated in the AB's AFL and optimized.



We discussed the conversion of signals into AB and the processes involved. The big step is converting the Trade code into AFL code and producing a baseline run that has very similar AB results to the FastTrack/Trade results. Getting a good baseline run is checkpoint for moving to the next step - setup of Optimization and Walk Forward Testing in AB. We discussed the concept of WF Testing and what's needed for a WF series of tests to be successful - and that is a test that is profitable and will give you confidence that your trading will be profitable. A review of 3 signals converted showed 3 results: DS28 as a successful conversion usable for trading, Microc2X which resulted in marginal test results, and BBLong which did not pass the baseline testing and needs more work to complete the conversion. The results from optimization may extend the life of the signal, update it for the current market conditions, but would not make significant improvements in the return.

An alternative approach is to use the FT signals, run them to get the most current results, and then bring them into AmiBroker to use them in a weighted blend that takes advantage of the best signals available. This capability has just been developed by Fred Tonetti, Don Howarter, and Don Carlson. Fred put together some programs under the banner of TradeRunner, which runs the entire library of Trade Programs (a separate effort that put together all the 15+ years of signal programs in the Dexter French library) and produces an up-to-date library of signals using the latest FastTrack database. A consolidated set of

signals is produced that eliminates duplicates and earlier versions of the same signal. Some 2232 signals are produced and cataloged to be imported into AB. Fred developed two AB programs to make use of these capabilities. The "load" program reads the catalog produced by TradeRunner, loads the selected signal names into static variables and the complete signals into AB as composite files. The second program does the screen-rank-weighting functions for a given security and picks the best 10 signals, and using IO, does a walk forward series of testing. The results I've seen from a few days of testing are great - hard to beat with anything I've used before. Fred is continuing to make improvements and these are available on the FT-Talk board.

Next month we do not have a program planned. As SIG Leader, I am stepping down and we need a new leader to organize and conduct the AmiBroker meetings.

While I spoke briefly of the VMWARE problems and how fast VMWARE responded, we spent most of our time answering questions from the floor.

A member of the audience was concerned about **rootkits** and how to detect and eradicate them. I admitted that I didn't know for sure beyond a complete reinstall but that I would look into it. Basically what I thought and what the person heard elsewhere was true; there is no constantly reliable way to remove

all rootkits. Sometimes all you can do is re-install but even that is not always enough.

Using Google, I was only able to find one set of instructions for repairing a rootkit infection that didn't solely involve the Sony kit or a re-installation.

"Although no tool can guarantee results for rootkit identification and removal, there is at least one program which has shown limited success from time to time in this area. It's called UnHackMe (http://safecomputing.umn.edu/guides/scan_unhackme.html)."

There was a question about setting-up SETI. It seems one person was having a problem with SETI claiming that his firewall was probably blocking SETI. He assumed that meant his PFW (personal firewall). I told him to try using SETI with the PFW turned off to see if that really was the culprit. Another audience member looked-up the port number SETI uses on his cell-phone and instructed the first guy to open that port up in his PFW.

In May we'll continue taking questions from the audience but may fall back on how web-based threats are handled by one of the most popular CMSes out there (Content Management System is basically a template for a large web application): Drupal.

Digital Photography SIG

Last Month

Because of transportation problems I arrived half an hour late to find Herb Wong keeping the SIG members entertained and informed. Thanks Herb, everyone seemed quite satisfied with the result.



I had expected replacing backgrounds to be a fairly ambitious topic; but even without arriving late the topic would have filled at least two meetings. We briefly discussed blurring the existing background and using an entirely different photo. Then we began talking about creating entirely new backgrounds from scratch; which was the main part of the topic. We quickly explored simple gradients between a pair of colors selected from the foreground or gradients between complements of those colors.

Then we started creating backgrounds from noise. It's amazing how many different backgrounds can be created from simple noise. We covered less than half of the quick simple ones.

We didn't even start on clouds which are even more variable than noise.

Cloud background for 'Yong Bird of Paradise' was created using two shades of green from leaves and blue from the flower.

Helpful Tip

Tradeoffs

It's best to have everything just right, but if you must err...

It's better to underexpose than over expose. It's easier to pull details out of under exposed shadows than to reclaim blown out details in over exposed highlights.

It's better to have too deep a depth of field than too shallow (the aperture controls DOF). It's tedious, but you can independently blur foregrounds and/or backgrounds later. There is no way to sharpen them if the DOF is too shallow

It's better to have too fast a shutter speed than too slow. If you have to, you can fake motion blur fairly well later. There is no way to remove motion blur you don't want.

It's better to set the ISO slightly too high than too low. Small amounts of noise are preferable to any amount of unintended blur.
(This is one problem that responds well to money. The more expensive digital cameras have less noise for each ISO setting.)

It's better to zoom/frame wide than telephoto. Zooming/framing too wide and having to crop and enlarge causes some loss of detail, Zooming too telephoto causes loss of picture.

Sometimes you can take multiple pictures (bracketing) with all of these settings; but when you can't, you should know ahead of time, the consequences of the various tradeoffs. The less time spent thinking about tradeoffs, the more time you can spend taking your picture. This is one of the best tradeoffs you can make!

Next Month

I'm not done milking the pictures of sheep yet, but as a change of pace, we will have part one of ten from "THE TRAVELLERS' BOOK OF COLOUR PHOTOGRAPHY." This book shows lots of A/B comparison travel photos with an emphasis on the idea that cameras don't take pictures, people do. It will be a good topic to start before people begin their summer travels. Beginners and experts alike will enjoy this segment.

We will also examine ways to correct what I call flash peter. Notice how the light peters out on the oranges and grapes in the before shot but not in the after shot. While this is an advanced topic, it is easy to understand and will open new doors for many of you. If you have some recent pictures, bring them so we can all see.

NOCCC Elections Coming Soon

Please consider becoming more involved in running the NOCCC. **During the June 2008 meeting we will be holding our annual elections.** All positions for on the NOCCC Executive Board are to be filled. While mostly taken from the Bylaws, the summary below is not all inclusive.

NOCCC Executive Board

The NOCCC Executive Board “subject to the limitations of those bylaws, shall debate, establish, amend, and update the policies for all the affairs and business of the NOCCC.”

“The Board shall concern itself with the disbursement of all NOCCC moneys. The Board shall consider the budget and such additional expenditure requests as are submitted by the president, and shall authorize such expenditures as it considers wise and appropriate.”

The NOCCC Executive Board is made up of four officers, eight elected directors, and ex-officio members. There are four officers of the club: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.

Duties of the President include:

- Represent the NOCCC to the community as the chief executive officer
- Set the agenda for and presides at all general meetings of the club
- Set the agenda for and presides at all meetings of the NOCCC Executive Board
- Appoint members to chair all standing and special committees and appointed positions
- Receive, on behalf of the NOCCC, all contributions to the club

Duties of the Vice-President include:

- Assume the duties of the president in the president's absence
- Assume special duties as may be directed by the president

Duties of the Secretary include:

- Establish and maintain a journal of the proceedings of all general and Executive Board meetings
- Establish and maintain a record of all NOCCC correspondence, and attend to correspondence as directed by the president or the Executive Board
- Establish and maintain a record of all property acquired by the NOCCC and identify the property as belonging to the NOCCC

Duties of the Treasurer include:

- Receive and deposit into the NOCCC accounts all moneys received
- Establish and maintain an accurate journal of all receipts and disbursements of NOCCC funds
- Report at the regular general meetings a summary of the financial status of the NOCCC

Elected directors

- The eight elected directors are on the Executive Board and along with the officers address any issue that comes before the Board

Ex-officio members of the Executive Board

- Ex-officio members of the Executive Board are the immediate past president, editor of the club newsletter and the web master

Appointed Positions

Other appointed positions are Membership Chairman, Editor, Business Solicitations/Lecture Series, Classified Advertising for members, Commercial Advertising, and Program/Speakers Coordinator. Contact the current club President if you are interested in any of these positions
