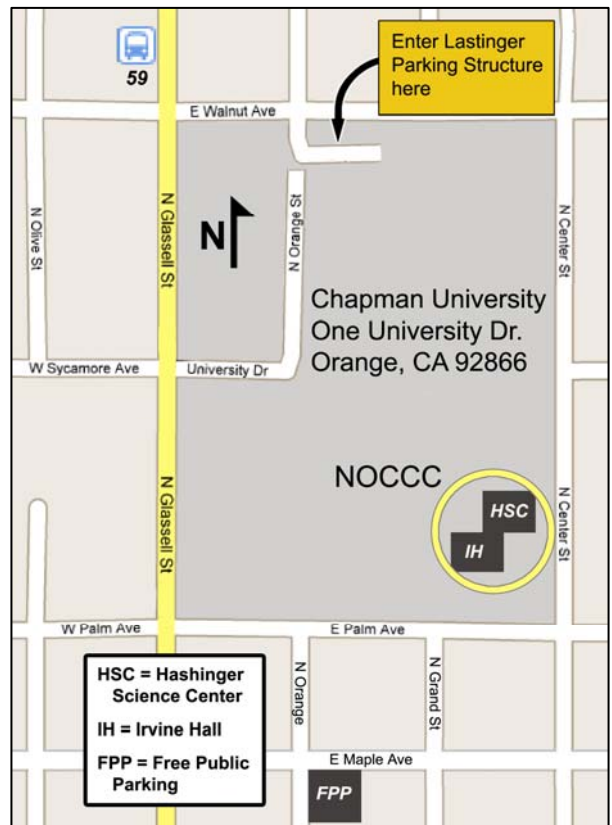
## Bus

The NOCCC Consignment Table will be set up during the September 2008 meeting. E-Waste will also be collected by Omni Technics, Inc.

- 1) Only current members can place items for sale, but non-members are welcome to purchase items from the table. This is a great place to get some money for your surplus computer items, and help the NOCCC at the same time.
- 2) The consignment table operates on a 90/10% basis — with the owner getting 90%, and the Club treasury 10%.
- 3) **You can fill out a Consignment Table User List and item tags at the table:**  
The user list and each tag must contain:
  - a) Seller's name
  - b) Seller's NOCCC membership number
  - c) Item name and description
  - d) Item asking price
- 4) All items and/or money may be picked up by the seller at any time, but no later than 2 p.m. on the day of sale. Any items and/or money not picked up by 2 p.m. will become the property of NOCCC and will be subject to disposal at the Club's discretion.
- 5) California disposal laws have made it illegal to put monitors and computers in the regular trash. If you have a display or computer that doesn't sell, you must agree to pick these items up. The club has no storage room available for unsold items.
- 6) NOCCC is NOT RESPONSIBLE in any way for items bought and/or sold at the Consignment Table. Each item is placed and sold on an AS-IS BASIS.

## Security Tidbits

As I write this, there is a big stink about a clipboard problem in Flash. A malicious web site can put something on your clipboard and from that point on your browser will only paste that something no matter what you cut/copy/choose. So your clipboard has been hijacked, big deal right? What if that something was a malicious URL or a malicious piece of JavaScript?

The important thing here is that it seems to be a problem (bug or design error) in flash and not in the browser or the OS. So, MAC/Linux/Opera/Firefox are not immune. From what I've read, it works any time Flash is running.

Well, one up for NoScript. I am always running it, and the POC (proof of concept) didn't work on my machine. Any web site needs my permission to run anything besides HTML. Since Flash isn't running I don't see the problem unless I am fooled into thinking the site is trustworthy – not impossible, just unlikely that the malicious critter can get around my paranoia.

Keepass has scored also. One reason I like Keepass (see [sourceforge.org](http://sourceforge.org)), is that when it clips my passwords so I can paste them into a form, it erases the clipboard in so many seconds. (I think I have mine set to 10).

While this flaw doesn't involve reading the clipboard, I expect that reading the clipboard is only an extension to this current bug and allowing people to play around with my clipboard has always worried me. A small program to read your clipboard and send it to someone else if it is formatted like a Social Security Number or a Credit Card Number can be written in JavaScript.

BTW: I hear that the JavaScript I mentioned above is very difficult in Firefox and requires special permissions that are turned off by default. So, out-of-the-box, Firefox is immune to a JavaScript program spying on your clipboard, but not to a Flash program doing so.

Your best bet? Keep Flash turned off unless you need it and keep control of your clipboard with sensitive information (passwords) with Keepass.

The calendar now feeds the front page. In the past, the HTML page for the front page needed to be altered and whenever we had new speakers or confirmed meeting dates someone needed to rewrite the HTML tables for the event calendar.

So when you go to the new page, you will see "our next meeting is blah blah blah (blah blah blah)". The first blah blah blah is the date of the next meeting in the calendar. The second blah blah blah is the description of that event.

To add an item, one of the Board members needs to log in, choose "create content" and "event". Now they have to fill out four fields in a form: date, duration of the event (all day), the title of the event, and a description of the event.

The title is a one-line piece of text that shows up on the list of future events. The description is only seen the month before on the front page and if you click on the event's title in the list of future events.

To edit an item, Board members simply chooses the date from the list of future events and they will see the date and body with an "edit" tab at the top. They choose the edit tab and they can change whatever they want.

So now the front page is completely automated and work only has to be done once to show-up several places on the web site.

# The New, the Best, and the Worst - A Linux Update

## Do You Ubuntu (yet)?

In February of 2002 I wrote:

*"It has been said that Windows XP is less buggy than its Windows 95, 98, and Me predecessors; damnation by faint praise. XP is also more expensive, can only be used on a single computer, and presents many incompatibilities with existing hardware and software. It hogs resources. That led me to wonder how Linux is coming along."*

Replace "XP" with "Vista" and history repeats itself. Furthermore, add that online security has dramatically worsened and that the security of Windows Vista is at best only marginally improved.

At the time I got a copy of the Red Hat Linux 7.2 distribution (list price \$60), included in a 1000+ pages "*Linux Bible*" and proceeded to evaluate it. I found that the limited software included in the distribution was nice and useful, but trying to install additional programs from the Internet was a nightmare.

Six years later desktop Linux has matured beyond recognition. Lindows, later renamed Linspire, was the first distribution making it a one-click operation to download and install software from a large online library. Originally the cost of acquiring Linspire and a one-year subscription to the library was \$100, but more recently the service has been available for free. I am still using an older version of Linspire daily, mostly for Web browsing, accessing email, and playing Freecell, Yukon or MahJongg.

In 2004 Marc Shuttleworth, a South African by birth, started a free new Linux distribution called Ubuntu ("humanity towards others"). In 1999 he sold Internet security software he had developed to Verisign for about \$575 million. He spent \$20 million of that on an 8-day trip by Soyuz to the Space Station and had plenty left over for a free software project. By now Ubuntu has become the most advanced and popular desktop Linux distribution, with the help of numerous volunteer contributors.

Ubuntu undergoes continuous upgrades as new and improved software is being developed and tested. Twice a year, in April and October, a new version is released. The latest version is numbered 7.10, for October of 2007, and is nicknamed "Gutsy Gibbon." (The next issue in April, version 8.4, will be named "Hardy Hero." You get the drift).

I installed Ubuntu side-by-side with Windows XP on my desktop computer, equipped with an AMD Athlon64 X2 4800+ dual core processor, 1 GB of RAM and an nVidia GeForce 7600 graphics card. I put it in a separate Linux partition on my hard drive previously used for Linspire. Before committing to the

installation I ran Ubuntu off the CD to verify that it was compatible with my hardware.

Once installed, Ubuntu was ready to go. It automatically set up my connection to the Internet with **Firefox**, and with my permission downloaded a large number of updates and additions released since October. The **OpenOffice.org** suite of programs, comparable to MS Office, was ready to go. I already had been using the Windows version of OpenOffice Writer so there was no learning curve whatsoever. **The Gimp**, an advanced graphics program similar to Adobe Photoshop Elements and with comparable features, came preinstalled. I also found drivers for my HP 812C printer and my Epson Perfection 3490 Photo Scanner. With all the necessary tools at hand I had no difficulty producing the January newsletter, including typing the articles, downloading articles from other user groups, and designing the layout and the new masthead. I printed the newsletter ready for Xeroxing and used OpenOffice Writer to save a separate version (omitting treasury data) to pdf format for distribution on the Internet.

Ubuntu provides many additional Linux programs:

- **Thunderbird**, well-known program.
- **Pidgin**, an Messenger graphical multi-protocol instant messaging client, capable of using AIM/ICQ, Yahoo!, MSN, IRC, Jabber, Napster, Zephyr, Gadu-Gadu, Bonjour, Groupwise, Sametime, SILC, and SIMPLE all at once.
- **GRAMPS**, genealogy program capable of GEDCOM files that are used in such programs as FamilyTree Maker for Windows. It can produce reports in various formats, such as text, HTML and PDF.
- **Gnucash** can track finances in multiple accounts, keeping running and reconciled balances. It has a graphical user interface, double entry, a hierarchy of accounts, expense accounts (categories), and can import Quicken QIF files and OFX files.
- Multiple **sound** and **video** programs for burning and reading CDs and DVDs, ripping and creating audio CDs, recording sound clips, playing movies, etc.
- **Popular games**, including **aisleriot** (anagram of solitaire), a large collection of card games, including Freecell. Also **blackjack**, **glchess**, **gnome-sudoku**, **gnometris** (Tetris), **gnomine** (minesweeper), **mahjongg**, and many others.

Additional programs can be installed with the **Add/Remove** function. Some powerful Linux programs that are not (yet) specifically adapted for Ubuntu can be retrieved with the **Synaptic** package manager, an easy-to-use graphical program to download applications from the Internet. I used it to download and install **ScrIBus**, an advanced desktop page layout manager capable of producing commercial grade output in PDF and Postscript. Difficult to use for a non-professional, but it worked just fine.

## Installation

It is easy to install Ubuntu and Windows on the same computer in separate partitions. Previously that required manually repartitioning your computer with a program such as Partition Manager, but the latest Ubuntu version, Gutsy Gibbon, includes its own Linux-based partition manager, **GParted**, and automatically uses it to scan your computer for available space

and to reconfigure that space (with your approval) to install itself. During boot-up the computer displays a menu of startup options, including Windows or Ubuntu.

I evaluated the ease of installation on an old Dell Inspiron 3800 laptop computer, with a 600 MHz Celeron CPU, 320 MB RAM and 880MB free disk space. Installation alongside the existing Windows Me went flawlessly. The computer didn't have a network card, but Ubuntu recognized the PCMCIA wireless network card and connected to the Internet after I provided the router parameters.

### "Sounds Great, But Why Bother?"

For the same reasons people move out of the city to the suburbs: security and cost-of-living. To enjoy the best of both worlds, install Ubuntu side-by-side with a basic Windows program. No need for expensive MS Office or Adobe programs. Use Ubuntu for safe online access, and keep Windows for those few occasions where Linux does not (yet) provide the means. As time goes by, it will probably be possible to abandon Windows altogether. Give it a try!

## All Computers Wait at the Same Speed

I first heard that phrase about ten years ago at a geek conference in Seattle. A decade ago is earlier than the Stone Age in computer years. It was probably meant to make fun of the propeller heads that couldn't live without the fasted CPU on their motherboard. The geeks' concern with processing speed seemed ridiculous to those who understood that computers spend very little of their time processing information. They spend it waiting for us to tell them to do something. You would certainly find your life very boring if you had to spend 99% of your time waiting for other people to act before you could do anything.

What are we talking about? We're talking about keeping your system properly tuned so that you don't have to wait while it tries to do its job. It's no secret that Vista has had performance problems. Microsoft has promised that Service Pack 1 should resolve most if not all performance issues. We've heard similar kinds of promises from Redmond before, but this time they say they really mean it. In fairness, not every performance issue can be laid at Microsoft's doorstep, but it's always fun to blame them because they're such an easy target.

Vista puts great demands on your CPU due to Aero and other assorted graphical gizmos built into the product. They should have named it the Eye Candy OS. Responding to the user community, Microsoft also added security features and additional functions that were not present in XP. When you ask your CPU to do more, you're adding overhead. This means you

need more CPU power or you live with a slower system. If Vista performance has been less than stellar, the good news is that you can do something about it other than buying a new computer. Here are some of the things you can do to make Vista more appealing from a performance standpoint.

You're probably tired of hearing this one. It's like mother telling you to eat your vegetables. You know she's right, but you don't want to hear it. **ADD MORE MEMORY.** Vista is hungrier for RAM than any of its predecessors, and with memory as cheap as it is, it doesn't make sense to keep it on a starvation diet. XP runs great on one gigabyte of RAM. Vista should have two gigabytes as a minimum, and you won't go wrong by installing even four gigabytes.

Even with enough physical memory, Vista can still act like a tired old dog if you have a lightweight video card. Go into the Performance Information and Tools utility in Control Panel, and check out your video card with the Windows Experience Index. You need a video card that's certified for Vista Premium and supports Direct X 10. Use the money you save on RAM to buy a good video card. Don't try to do this one on the cheap.

A real help to good performance is bringing your power settings to the High Performance option. Do this from the Power Options utility in Control Panel. The default setting is Balanced which is OK for XP but not Vista. The High Performance setting gives you full access to all the Power in the CPU.

Turn off the sidebar. While this feature is visually appealing, it has few socially redeeming traits. Turning off this feature can sometimes result in significantly faster startups and shutdowns. Disable the sidebar by right-clicking it. Select Properties, and remove the checkmark in the box that starts the sidebar when Vista wakes up.

Fine tune your indexing options. Vista has a great search feature, but it's totally dependent on indexing the files and programs on your hard drive. It's a mixed blessing. You have a fantastic search capability when you index all locations, but you take a performance hit. By indexing fewer areas, performance will improve, but your search feature will be less robust.

Vista won't let you turn off indexing completely, but you can disable indexing for locations that may not be important to you. Do this from the Performance Information and Tools utility in Control Panel.

Here's another "eat your veggies" type tip. Empty the Recycle Bin and adjust it so it doesn't take up more than 2% of your hard drive. Right click on the Recycle Bin, select Properties, and make the necessary adjustments in the dialog box. Don't forget to defrag your disk once in a while, and empty the Recycle Bin before you defrag, not after.

Open My Computer from the Desktop. Right click on the C: drive, select Properties and check how much space you have left on your hard drive. If you're approaching 90% or more, you need to take non-essential files and move them to another location. Vista needs free disk space to perform certain housekeeping functions, and if it has to hunt around for room or use virtual memory, your performance hit could be enormous.

## E-Mail Responsibilities

E-mail is a very valuable method of almost instant communication. However, many people operate under an illusion that it is private. It is not. Once sent, it is effectively broadcast to the world. So, one should **NEVER** send anything that they might regret. Once it is sent, it is now in other people’s hands. The recipient may or may not care as much about controlling your e-mails distribution as you do.

Just suppose you send something clever about someone you know to a friend or acquaintance and they bring it up on the screen. Then, they take a break and go to coffee, leaving it on the screen. Another person passes by, snoops, and sees the e-mail. They also think it is clever, and make a copy of it and send it to someone they know, etc.

Or, the employer records all e-mail traffic passing within their company, which they have every right to do, since the equipment is theirs.

Worse yet, some people send messages that they believe are benign and strictly business, yet some self-anointed “god” thinks otherwise.

Yet even sneakier are viruses that can unknowingly, by you, forward your e-mails elsewhere; or, police and other snoops tapping your connection. There are innumerable ways by which your “private” traffic can go public.

So, the **BOTTOM LINE** is: compose your messages with care, check the addressees listed, and review the message before pressing the “SEND” key.

Oh, by the way: do not think that once sent and “deleted”, that the file is gone from your computer. When you “delete” a file, this **DOES NOT ERASE THE FILE**. All this does is change the first letter of the file name in the directory. The file, in all its glory, remains untouched on the hard drive, which is why it is so easy to recover it. Technology has provided a variety of means to recover and reconstitute “deleted” files.

To conclude, e-mail is a tremendously valuable means of almost instant communication. Just make sure that you use it carefully, thoughtfully and wisely.

## The Digital Photography Companion

I had previously browsed through this book several times and wondered why anyone who had been photographing before the digital era would want another book telling how to take better photos. I had bought my first 35mm camera approximately 55 years ago and was active in the heyday of camera club (35mm slides) competitions. The competitive urge has waned but I do have a Canon EOS Digital Rebel T/350D which I have used infrequently. My inadequacy hit me when, on Automatic, the self timer started interfering with my taking simple record shots. Too rushed to study, my temporary fix was to change to Programmed Auto Exposure, which worked, knowing I had now had some serious familiarization to do. When I next browsed the book I saw a way to familiarize myself with the intricacies my digital camera. The author's first sentence of the first chapter is, "The first steps toward taking control of your photography are to become familiar with your camera's components, and then to learn exactly what they do."

The author, Derrick Story, is the digital media evangelist for O'Reilly. His experience includes more than 20 years as a photojournalist, managing editor for O'Reilly Network, and a speaker for IDG, PMA, and Santa Fe Workshops. He has written two other books and coauthored another. His credentials cover digital photography, Aperture, iPhoto, Photoshop, Lightroom, speaking and training. He also has a Webcast, Five Ways to Make Your Photos Look Better, at <http://www.oreillynet.com/pub/e/937>. This happens to be a 54 minute presentation.

The book, First Edition, March 2008, ISBN 10: 0-596-51766-1 | ISBN 13: 9780596517663, contains 230 pages and is organized in five chapters. There are 111 illustrations, 59 of which are high quality photographs, all but four taken by Story. A chart in the appendix provides details. The frontispiece, shown here was taken in Iceland by Story using a Canon EOS SD with a 60 mm lens. Conditions of exposure were ISO 100, f/9.5, 1/250 second. Some reviewers claim the book is worth its price just for the charts contained in its 18- page appendix. Besides the photo data, they cover recommendations, advise and data, categorized as *Exposure compensation reference guide*, *Flash mode settings*,

*White balance settings*, *Metering modes with explanations*, *Camera modes with explanations*, *Exposure starting points for sunset* and *"astrophotography"*, *Megapixels-to-print-size reference*, *Scene mode information*, *Color temperature chart in Kelvin*, and *Number of pictures to capacity of memory card reference*. As an example in using the charts, I am going to consider 8 in. x 10 in. images at 200 ppi (1600x2000) and I want to estimate the number of high quality JPEG images I can collect with a 1GB memory card. The chart's column designated as 1704x2272 (4MP), shows 494 for 1GB which will suffice.



The book is made up of five chapters titled, What Is It? How Does It Work? How to Shoot Like a Pro, I've Taken Great Pictures, Now What?, and Printing Made Easy. The first is intended to help choose the right camera (DSLRs, compact cameras, or hybrids) and get a rundown on all of the typical features. The second is a guide of digital camera controls explaining such things as Aperture Value (Av) Mode and Auto Exposure all the way to White Balance. The third can be downloaded in PDF format from <http://oreilly.com/catalog/9780596517663/chapter/index.html>, for which I am delighted that I did. I have never been pleased in reading Acrobat documents, but this sample had such appeal that I obtained the entire book in PDF. It turns out that the 5½ in. x 8½ in. page size matched my monitor settings exactly so that I could advance a complete page at a time by either arrow, scroll bar or page thumbnail. Should you view Chapter 3, you will find that it contains 13 of the book's 40 tips. There are also reminders, warnings and definitions as presented as similar sidebars. The fourth chapter gives advice for sharing photos, converting from color to black & white as well as an overview of photo management applications, from Adobe Photoshop Lightroom to Apple iPhoto. The last chapter deals with the various options for printing and help in selecting the right inkjet printer for home (and what to do with it once you get it there.). There are also reminders, warnings and definitions which are presented as sidebars similar to those for tips.

The first tip of the book is, "The best camera is the one you have with you. Many of the illustrations in this book were captured with compact cameras. (See the Appendix for the table listing all images with their metadata.) Don't believe that you have to have a \$5,000 DSLR to make great photos." The small book

size was deliberate so that it could be conveniently carried in a camera or gadget bag.

The book lists as \$24.99 USD for paper back and \$19.99 PDF (User Group members can get a 35% discount from O'Reilly). More information is available at the O'Reilly website (<http://oreilly.com/catalog/9780596517663/index.html>). The book is so organized that I now know what to look for in my owner's manual. For example, I probably never would have realized I could shoot in Black and White; this feature was so well hidden in my owner's manual. By correlating between these two, (manual and book) I have found information I needed for RAW and bracketing. An added bonus which I received by researching for this article is that a similar book, by Ben Long, will be released in August for the Rebel 4500 which will still be useful to me. Its title is *The Canon EOS Digital Rebel XSi/450D Companion*.

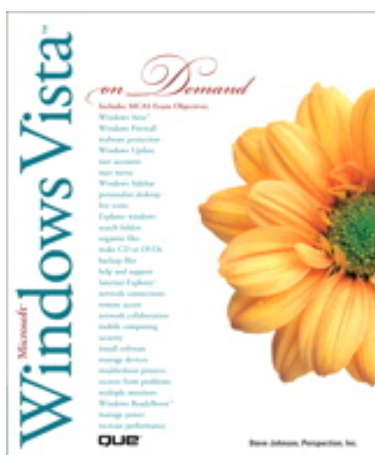

## Windows Vista on Demand 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition

In the *About the Author* section of this book, Steve Johnson is credited with writing more than 45 books on a variety of computer topics and being the founder of Perspection, Inc, a computer training company. In the *Acknowledgements* section, it says this book “has been created by the professional trainers and writers at Perspection, Inc.” This book is Safari



Enabled and provides a 45-day free trial access to the online version. That means that it is one of thousands of online books that the publisher, Que, makes available online through membership in the Safari Bookshelf program.

Aimed at beginner-to-intermediate users of Vista, an already substantial book at over 560 pages, the content is expanded considerably with the online resources that Perspection offers. A new features guide, a complete keyboard shortcuts list, many more photos and graphics, a whole new chapter of content developed after publication (Sharepoint Server 2007), and example files to use in conjunction with some of the practice tasks in the book.

Setting aside the actual content of the book for a minute, the design, layout, and implementation of his book warrants a number of comments all by itself. First, the book is printed in full color on a non-glossy paper so all of the screen shots, of which there are many, look the same as you see them on the actual screen. Color is used in several other ways to help

navigation within this book. In the contents section, each chapter heading is printed in a different pastel color. Each page of that chapter uses the same pastel color to print a color tab on the page edge. The group of pages that comprise that chapter can clearly be seen on the edge of the book by the color of the tab. Only six colors are used for the eighteen chapters which gives you three groups of six tabs, making navigating to a particular chapter quite easy. Most pages are divided into two columns. The left hand column contains the numbered steps necessary to perform a particular task. As a background, that column uses a paler version of the tab color, and is quite a bit like using highlighter. The right-hand column contains the screen shots on a white background. The screen shots contain one or more numbered circles with a line drawn to the appropriate spot on the screen that corresponds to the step number located in the left hand column.

Many of the left-hand columns have a small bordered window that is titled “Did You Know?” that brings out some useful additional pieces of information. A few also have another bordered window titled “See Also” when there is a related function somewhere else in the book that warrants looking at. The combination of all of these features makes looking up the answer to a question easy, and gives the book a clean, well defined, uncluttered appearance with liberal amounts of white space ( or, in the case of the left-hand columns, liberal amounts of pastel space).

This is a “how to book” not a textbook. It is designed to help you look up a problem area and find an answer to a question. If you actually read through a chapter from beginning to end, it does appear that there was some effort put in to having these subjects covered in increasing order of complexity to a large extent. The beginning of each chapter has an introduction section that provides a bit of an overview of the concepts that are addressed in that particular chapter. Each task is usually covered on one page, occasionally two pages are required. Most of the tasks have a text section that provides some contextual background for why a user might want to use a particular function.

The “Managing Files and Folders,” Chapter 3, I gave extra scrutiny as I have been appalled at how few people know how to use **Windows Explorer** and an even lesser number that understand the file structure that it allows them to operate on. Few users are even aware that Explorer allows them to search for files that contain a text string. But for those few, this books explanation of how Vista allows you to do the Boolean text string search should delight them. Reading this chapter from beginning to end will give users a good idea of how to use Windows Explorer in general and the new features incorporated into Vista in particular.

I am happy to have this volume on my bookshelf and I think you will be as well. Be sure to take advantage of the user group discount outlined in the Membership Benefits column of the Orange Bytes. # Norton AntiVirus 2008 Software

Microsoft has made a couple of moves that created a great deal of turmoil in the antivirus world. When they initially released Vista, they did not go out of their way to provide the necessary access to the Vista code that the various antivirus companies of the world needed in order to make their products work. At nearly the same time, Microsoft released their One Care product that is basically in direct competition with all the other antivirus companies of the world. In a few obscure corners of the web, there was an isolated suggestion or two that there might be some connection between those two events. At least one suggested it was Netscape déjà vu all over again.



Regardless, it clearly put a great deal of marketing pressure on the other companies. This product lists for \$39.99. Between discounts, sales, and rebates, it is not uncommon to find it for free (except for sales tax), or nearly so, after one or more of the above. From what I have read, there is a significant internal difference between the 2008 and 2007 version of Norton Antivirus. I had the 2007 version installed on one of my computers which had 110 days left to go on a subscription. Norton offered a free upgrade to the 2008 version and I accepted. Thinking that if they are offering it for free, it must provide significantly improved protection etc. etc. That resulted in a multi-hour nightmare that required a Norton technical person to remotely work on my computer for over an hour in order to get things working properly again. Apparently if all vestiges of previous editions of Norton Antivirus are not removed from a computer before 2008 is installed it can cause problems. There is a Norton removal tool that can be downloaded and will remove all traces of previous antivirus programs from Norton.

When I opened the box, it contained three things; the installation CD with the product key on the envelope with a warning not to lose it, a one-page quick install guide, and a printed version of the manual. There is a PDF version of the manual located on the installation CD along with an installable copy of Adobe Reader in case you don't have it. The quick install guide instructs you to be sure you are connected to the Internet and have closed all other programs which I did. The auto start feature quickly brought me to the license agreement screen, all 2726 words of that, and I clicked on accept. I entered the product key. I declined to do a scan first as I knew this was a clean system, and the program started installing 300MB of stuff on the hard disk. This takes a while even on a fairly quick machine.

A screen popped up informing me that I needed to uninstall Zone Alarm before the installation could proceed. The Zone Alarm installed on this computer was the free firewall only version and not the competing antivirus suite, so I told it to proceed anyway. The installation finished without any additional complaints. A significant amount of downloads were acquired and installed. A full scan of the computer reported no problems and did not take very long as there was not much on the machine other than XP and Office. On my main computer, with over a million files, it takes a while.

Even though no malware was found, the bright yellow Norton button in the Task Bar had a prominent red X. in it. It was complaining about the fact that the auto update feature of XP. was not enabled. As I did not want it enabled, I went looking for a way to tell it that. There is an option to tell Norton Antivirus to ignore that check. While looking for that feature I discovered that Norton Antivirus 2008 now has an inbound firewall. A feature that is redundant to Zone Alarm, one that I do not want, and apparently one that has no means of being turned off.

From what I have experienced, and read, Norton does as good a job of detecting and removing malware as any of the other offerings out there. I have used Norton Antivirus for several years and have had almost no problems with infections. The problems that I have had seem not much different than those reported for other brands of antivirus. As a result, I will continue to use it until some compelling reason to change occurs. In September, Norton is previewing their 2009 (hopefully not bigger), better, faster model of the program at a local dog and pony show. I will report on that at our October meeting.

## Pinnacle PCTV HD Ultimate Stick

Some computer products just have a 'wow' factor on first sight; the Pinnacle PCTV HD Stick is one of those devices. It is a TV tuner on a USB stick and not just any TV tuner but one that is capable of pulling down Standard





Definition (SD) and High Definition (HD) content to your PC. On seeing the Pinnacle presentation on their PCTV HD Stick at the APCUG Convention in 2008, I have been itching to get my hands on one. I was imagining a new widescreen computer monitor coupled with this device as a means of having a really cheap HDTV. So I purchased a new widescreen monitor (22") and the PCTV HD Stick. The USB device comes in 3 flavors, PCTV HD (\$69.99), PCTV HD Pro (\$99.99) and the top of the line PCTV HD Ultimate (\$129.99). There is also an internal card version (\$79.99). All these devices are designed for Windows XP and are Vista Certified. There is a separate device with similar features for Mac users (\$129.99). I opted for the 'Ultimate' model because of its onboard memory DVR and software. More on that later, but the Ultimate is a plug and play that allows you to start watching and record SD and HDTV almost immediately.

### **Packaging**

The packaging contains a mini remote control including batteries, a portable telescoping high-gain antenna, A/V adapter cable, A/V adaptor cable, a USB extender cable and the usual manuals and CDs. With the Ultimate model you also get a neat soft leatherette carrying pouch.

### **Setting Up**

Setting up the PCTV Ultimate could not be easier. This model has all the software preinstalled including the Personal Video Recorder (PVR) that allows you to record up to 2 hours of video. You just plug it in and follow the onscreen instructions and start enjoying live TV within seconds. The on-board memory on the Ultimate can also be used to store additional files. You run setup once, even if you use the device on a different PC, the settings and preference are stored on the device.

You have 3 options in setting up the PCTV:

- 1) Antenna (for digital/analog TV reception);
- 2) Cable (analog TV reception);
- 3) Capture from Cable/Satellite Set-top Box.

For this review we will be using Option 1 – Antenna (digital/analog TV reception). During setup, the PCTV will scan for SD and HD signals via the included antenna. The antenna is designed for digital and analog TV reception in regions with fair to good signal coverage. When using the antenna, it should be fully extended in the upright position as high as possible and near a window. The base of the antenna is magnetic so it should not be placed near a cathode ray tube monitor, television or similar equipment as the electromagnetic field of such devices might deteriorate the signal quality. Also be careful with the magnetic base around other objects that are sensitive to magnetic forces – i.e. PC hard drive. In my region I was able to download all the local SD and HD stations available within my region via the antenna.

### **Software**

When you first install the PCTV HD Ultimate Stick, it checks whether all the required drivers and the .NET 2.0 Framework are already on your computer and, if necessary, installs them. After the initial startup, every time you start the program, a TV

screen appears immediately on your desktop. The integrated memory on the PCTV HD Ultimate Stick is divided into 2 different areas or drives.

- A re-writable memory area (removable media area) with the TVCenter Pro program and available memory for recorded shows or other user data. The drive is labeled PCTV flash.
- A read-only memory area (CD-ROM area) contains the drivers. This drive is labeled PCTV Start

Also included in the package is Pinnacle Studio QuickStart that allows you to edit your recordings or home movies and transfer them to DVD, complete with custom menus and soundtracks.

### **Controls**

The package comes with a full-featured remote control. Although small in size it does give complete control of the PCTV. If you elect to use Windows Media Center, the included remote will not work. You will have to purchase a compatible Windows Media Center remote that is available from Pinnacle.

### **Display**

The first time Pinnacle TVCenter Pro is accessed, you will see the Player. This screen can be full-screen or resized to suit. There are navigation icons that select settings, channels, TV or Radio and the program guide.

### **FM Radio**

As sort of an added bonus, during setup PCTV stick also scans for available internet radio signals for play back on your PC. It categorizes them by genre rather than call letters. Unfortunately, the software does not provide any other information regarding the available stations or for the music that is being played.

### **Picture Quality and Sound Quality**

The quality of picture and sound is dependent on your monitor and speakers. The PCTV HD stick is capable of providing digital sound, SD and HD quality picture that if is available within your region.

### **Windows Media Center**

If you have a PC equipped with Microsoft Windows Vista Home Premium or Ultimate or Windows XP Media Center Edition 2005 and you want to watch and record TV using the Windows Media Center application, then you will have to run TV setup in that application. I'm running Windows Vista Ultimate on my PC and using the Windows Media Center software for my TV viewing and recording, but you can use either product. There is not a conflict between the included software and Windows Media Center. However, the Windows Media Center software overrides the included TVCenter Pro software for TV viewing and recording. The included remote does not work with Windows Media Center; however you can select channels directly by keyboard input and/or by mouse when viewing TV via Windows Media Center. You can also opt to purchase a compatible Media Center Remote control that is available from Pinnacle for \$29.99. Again, to get the PCTV HD stick to work with Windows Media Center is the matter of selecting the TV setup in Windows Media Center and following

the onscreen instructions. Window Media Center will recognize the device and do its own scan and download a TV guide that is used to identify the channels and for time shifting. The time shifting feature allows you to record your favorite TV shows and play them back at a later time. Windows Media Center does not support some of the onboard memory features of the PCTV HD Ultimate stick.

## Conclusion

I now have my cheap HDTV and so far I have not been disappointed. The PCTV HD is pulling free off the air HD signals and displaying them on my monitor in full HD. The PCTV HD Ultimate Stick is a slick ultra-portable USB device that will allow you to watch and record SD and free HD TV. The TV tuner and personal video recorder software run directly from the Stick's on-board flash memory, so you can plug it into any PC and start watching and recording TV in seconds – no installation required.

It supports both analog (NTSC) and digital (ATSC) TV signals. The tuner hardware is also ready for ClearQAM (unencrypted digital cable).

You can record up to 2 hours of TV directly to the stick for playback on any PC and save recordings to your hard drive in MPEG-1/2 or DivX formats or even direct-to-DVD.

# Zune 8

Thanks to good friends in the Microsoft Windows group in Redmond, I received a shiny new, red 8 GB Zune during CES. It has a beautifully engraved "www.zuneusergroup.com" (my site) on the back. Here is my assessment.

## Packaging

The compact packaging of the 4/8 GB Zune does not contain a software CD like the original Zune. You get a manual, a USB cable and a set of earphones. The box comes in a soft pouch and could be mistaken for a perfume box.

## Setting Up

You first set up the Zune software on the PC by going to [www.zune.net/setup](http://www.zune.net/setup). You get to choose between the "full Zune experience" and simply downloading the software. I already had the latest software on account of my old Zune 30, so I explored the Zune.net site.

There you set up a Zune account, if you don't have one. This enables you to give your Zune a name and buy music from the

Zune Marketplace, an online music store. You can customize your Zune at [zuneoriginals.net](http://zuneoriginals.net).

The Zune 8 refuses to work until you have installed the Zune software on the PC and connected the player at least once. When you connect the device to the PC, it proceeds to update the firmware. This was painless.

## Software

The Zune software is easy to use and is intuitive. It was able to find all my music, video and images and sync them to the player. I can also sync my podcast subscriptions automatically. Unless it was a coincidence, the software showed both my Zunes in their correct colours - a nice touch.

## Controls

The main input on the player is the Zune Pad, a rounded rectangular touch-sensitive button. You change the volume and select options by rubbing your thumb from top to bottom or left to right. The default touch sensitivity was fine for me, unlike the over-sensitive controls of the original Creative Zen, which tended to overshoot the desired selection.

## Display

The tiny 4.5 cm (1.8-inch) scratch-resistant, glass-covered screen is watchable for short music videos that have close-ups of performers but it would not be fun to watch a full-length movie on this model. During music playback, the backlight disappears and helps to conserve battery life.

The USB cable acts as the media conduit to and from the PC and also charges the battery. There is a small, recessed set of holes to take a wrist strap, which is not supplied.

## FM Radio

The FM radio displays RBDS data, so you can see the name of the radio station and the song being played. You cannot record a radio program, as you can on some Creative units. The tuner picked up all my local stations.

## Sound Quality

The sound quality is fine too, just like the original Zune 30. There is a good selection of pre-loaded media. The supplied earphones do a basic job, but as with all players, you need to buy high-quality headphones to get optimum sound. There isn't an equalizer (EQ) control or preset, so you cannot customize the sound to your liking. This option is present on the old Zune 30, so its omission seems to be a deliberate decision. Why hobble sound quality?

## Sharing

The latest 2.3 (1145) firmware is common to all models and renames "Community" to "Social". You can share a song by sending it to a nearby Zune (that is turned on and has wireless enabled). The other Zune has to accept it and will get three plays (the three days limitation has been removed).

Steven Breitbart mentioned that two computer security-related bills are pending in Congress and encouraged everyone to investigate and contact their representatives. More precisely, as stated in the September 2008 issue of Consumer Reports: "Two security-related bills are in committee in the Senate. The Counter Spy Act prohibits installing software to turn a computer into a zombie (a PC that can be controlled remotely) or changing browser settings without a user's consent. The Identity Theft Enforcement and Restitution Act makes it easier for federal authorities to prosecute ID theft and provide restitution for victims."

Our speaker was Wilfred Nilsen of Real Time Logic.com ([www.realtimelogic.com](http://www.realtimelogic.com)), a local company. They produce BarracudaDrive personal server software. The question they

asked was whether a web server, usually complex, be simplified enough for a home user or a small business. The answer is yes, and the cost is only \$69! A free 45-day trial is available, but meeting attendees got a license code good for two years of usage.

One purpose for this software is to have greater control of the server that hosts your web site and which can be accessed remotely, but securely. Using the BarracudaDrive software, the

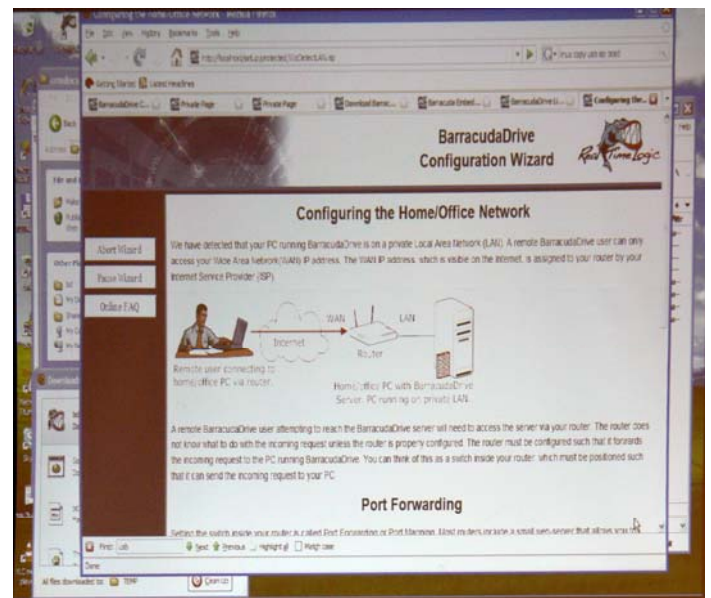
owner creates a personal web site. All of the configuration of the BarracudaDrive server is done using various web pages, somewhat similar to setting up a router.

BarracudaDrive includes four major components:

- A content management system
- A blog creator
- A web file manager/WebDAV Server
- A HTTPS Tunnel

The content management system can be used to set up a "Contact Us" web page, so remote users can contact the server's owner directly instead of using email. These messages are saved in a data base.

The blog creator included is Microsoft Live Writer, which is



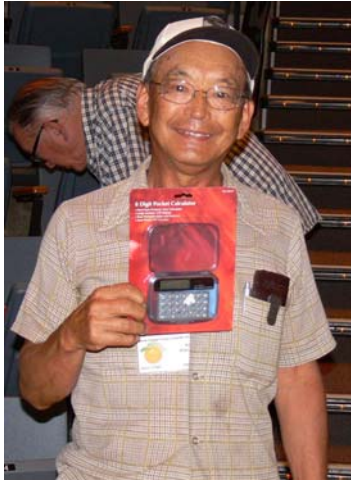
available free.

File management, as everything else involved with the BarracudaDrive server, is done using a web browser. This is done using WebDAV, which is a part of Windows and allows users to access and edit a document directly on the server, thus eliminating duplication of files from the server to a remote PC and the need to synchronize them later.

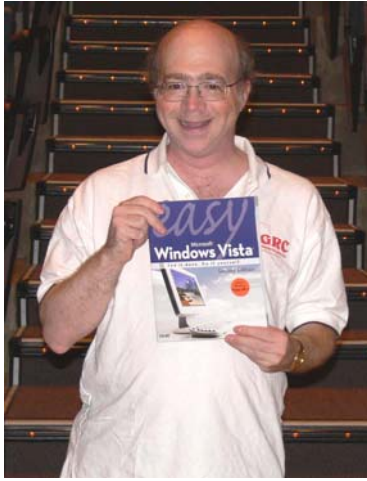
BarracudaDrive was designed to be easy to install, but still very secure. Access to folders or even individual files, can be set for all users. Connections to a drive on another PC are designed to be temporary and need to be set up again after the PC is rebooted. Also, a remote user is banned after four incorrect tries at logging in to the server.

## Digital Photography SIG

### Last Month

We spent two full hours examining features of flickr.com and just scratched the surface. The main purpose of flickr is to allow members to share photographs and videos with each other. Anyone can look at photos in flickr, but a free membership provides enhanced capabilities. Some people find a paid membership of \$25 per year to provide worthwhile benefits. I urge you to go to flickr.com (owned by Yahoo) and look around. I'm sure you will find it worth while. While you're there please try [http://www.flickr.com/groups/noccc\\_dp/](http://www.flickr.com/groups/noccc_dp/). This is a new group operated by the NOCCC Digital Photography SIG. It doesn't do much yet, but as time goes on it will grow. Currently anyone with a flickr account can send photos to this group. We plan to have photography contests and share photos between SIG members. It's likely other uses will also be found. Check it out.



Another useful flickr function I've discovered is that when you find a photo you like, flickr will often tell you what make and model camera was used to take it, give you the full specifications for that camera, (sometimes it will give you a graph of how popular that camera has been over the past year), and show you other photos taken with that camera. If you are thinking about a new camera purchase this is very useful information. For example please refer to this month's helpful tip.

### Helpful Tip

In the past I have expressed the opinion that anything greater than about eight Megapixels in a pocket-sized camera would likely result in noisy images. This is because the imaging chips in the pocket-sized cameras are only about the size of a small fingernail which causes a low signal-to-noise ratio as more and more pixels are jammed in. Well, one of the features of flickr lets you see photos taken by many types of digital cameras and I'm being forced to re-evaluate my opinion I have recently seen several photos on flickr taken with 10-12 Megapixel cameras that are pretty good. Oddly enough these have all been taken with SONY cameras. Please see the picture at <http://www.flickr.com/photos/islespunkfan/2685495056/>. It was taken with a 12.1 Megapixel SONY Cyber-shot DSC-W200 that costs about \$330.00 I think you'll agree that it compares quite favorably with this photo, taken with a \$2,000.00 SLR.



The aquariums were different but in both cases the lighting was controlled to balance against the bioluminescent jelly fish which are the same.

The colors in this shot picked up saturation because I have adjusted the contrast to enhance the details. But, the noise level in the SONY photo is just as good as in this photo taken with a Nikon D200. If you look at the very end of the right hand column, click on the more properties link to see all of the exif info for the SONY shot. The Sony was able to use an amazing 1600 ISO and get the shutter speed to 1/13<sup>th</sup> of a second. The best the Nikon D200 could manage was an ISO of 400 with a shutter speed of 1/2 second. I have disliked the SONY Company since the 1960s and I hate their memory sticks. But, they make four times as many pocket cameras w/optical view finders as any other company and their 12 mega-pixel pocket cameras seem very good indeed.

### September Meeting

Some photographers travel to the far corners of the world to find exotic subject mater for their cameras. That's all well and good, but your own home is full of wondrous photo fodder for pictures that will amaze your friends and relatives. Macro photography allows every day items to be viewed in spectacular new ways.

(An interesting macro I found on flickr is located here: <http://www.flickr.com/photos/sediama/2340521779/>.) It took me a while to figure out what it is, but I liked it instantly. This is a common trait for macros.

Technically, a macro photo has an image on the negative that is equal in size or larger than the original object. Over the years, particularly since the introduction of digital photography, ordinary close-ups have been lumped in with macro photography. This photo of a key ring is a close-up photo and looks somewhat special just because you seldom look that close at a key ring.



Other macro shots can look like you traveled to Mars or to the deepest parts of the ocean to take your picture when you actually had to go no further than your yard or kitchen.

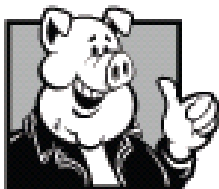

installed, but also a large number of FREE application programs. Most people are accustomed to spending fifteen minutes or more installing Microsoft Office after they have installed Windows XP and the required drivers. It was a little hard for a couple of people to grasp the concept of the equivalent of Microsoft Office being installed at the same time that the operating system was installed. Not to mention all the other applications that were installed as well.

In this case, which is certainly not true in all cases, Ubuntu knew about the hardware that was in that computer and did not require the installation of any motherboard drivers, LAN drivers, audio drivers, or video drivers. # August 2008 Main Meeting Barracuda Drive

What all this means is that a remote user can download or upload data without going through a third party server, which is a potential security risk. This method of accessing folders and files is more efficient than those used by other products, such as GoToMyPC, which is set up for use by one person only.

More information about this product is available at: <http://barracudaserver.com/products/BarracudaDrive>

Mr. Nilsen recommended that we take the time to go through the configuration settings of BarracudaDrive to ensure it is set up correctly. The software itself provides a lot of information.



One of the more interesting things shown was a small, standalone box, which runs a version of the BarracudaDrive software. The box, which is about the size of a DSL modem, is visible in the photograph of our speaker

and is also shown above. The idea is that it can be left running with only an external hard drive. This eliminates the big PC case with a large power supply, fans, peripheral boards, monitor, and keyboard, so it requires a lot less energy and takes up very little space. The server box is controlled from another PC when needed.

# All Computers Wait

Keep your device drivers up-to-date. Device drivers were designed to ensure that programs or hardware peripherals could "talk" to the system without problems and do their jobs properly. Newer drivers can improve 3D performance, fix bugs and other graphical glitches in games and video programs. Device drivers can avoid memory conflicts and prevent programs from squabbling over resources. Newer device drivers can support innovative features within applications, and ensure compatibility among different programs.

These are only some of the things you can do to improve Vista performance. Removing unnecessary startup programs, preventing spyware and virus infections, and updating old software are additional steps you can take. If your system is frequently hanging up or crashing after doing everything you can do to improve performance, then it's time to consider reformatting your hard drive and reinstalling everything, but that's another article.
