NOCCC Executive Board Descriptions

"The NOCCC Executive Board "subject to the limitations of those bylaws, shall debate, establish, amend, and update the policies for all the affairs and business of the NOCCC."

"The Board shall concern itself with the disbursement of all NOCCC moneys. The Board shall consider the budget and such additional expenditure requests as are submitted by the president, and shall authorize such expenditures as it considers wise and appropriate." The NOCCC Executive Board consists of four officers, eight elected directors, and ex-officio members. There are four officers of the club: President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Duties of the President

Represent the NOCCC to the community as the chief executive officer.

Set the agenda for and presides at all general meetings of the club.

Set the agenda for and presides at all meetings of the NOCCC Executive Board.

Appoint members to chair all standing and special committees and appointed positions.

Receive, on behalf of the NOCCC, all contributions to the club.

Duties of the Vice President

Assume special duties as may be directed by the president.

Duties of the Secretary

Establish and maintain a record of all NOCCC correspondence, and attend to correspondence as directed by the president of the Executive Board.

Duties of the Treasurer

Receive and deposit into the NOCCC accounts all moneys received.

Establish and maintain a record of all real or personal property acquired by the NOCCC and cause said property to be permanently identified as property of the NOCCC.

Suggest, if appropriate, to the Executive Board that an audit be made and reported to the general membership.

Elected Directors

The eight elected directors are on the Executive Board and, along with the four officers, address any issue that comes before the Board.

Ex-officio members of the Executive Board

Ex-officio members of the Executive Board are the immediate past president, editor of the club newsletter and the webmaster. The President appoints the editor and webmaster.

Other Appointed Positions

These positions are Membership Chairman, Reviews Editor, Public Relations, Business Solicitations/Lecture Series, Classified Advertising for Members, Commercial Advertising, Webmaster and Programs/Speakers Coordinator. April 1st - Main Meeting Report

This report was written from an audio file taken of the meeting. While Jim Sanders, NOCCC club President was clear, comments from people in the audience were not always audible. A sincere attempt was made to include the core of the comments made, but the speakers did not usually identify themselves before speaking. Apologies if your comment was left out.

President Jim Sanders opened the meeting with a whopping 50-minute chunk of club business. He asked, "How many have read his President's message in the email or Orange Bytes or elsewhere?" Jim stated that for the club to continue we need more volunteers. Simply put, if we don't get more people to volunteer, the club will fold. He has been President for 4 years, it takes a lot of time and he needs to concentrate on other aspects of his life. If he is the last NOCCC President, he will have to disperse the substantial funds of the club to another computer related non-profit per the By-laws. Jim has been coming to the NOCCC for almost its entire existence; it equates to over a Years worth of Sundays. Including preparation for his SIGs, he estimates he has spent two years of his life on the NOCCC. Jim has been tasked with finding speakers for the Main Meeting, and when he can't, he speaks on a variety of interesting topics.

Chapman University has provided us with an excellent facility to hold our meetings; our contract with Chapman is worth \$9,000 per year; we are one of 2 organizations (The OC Astronomy Club is the other one) that get comped. If we were to move the club, or change the day we meet, that relationship would change. Jim stated that the Method of Operation of the club is good the way it works with Chapman now, so changing the day we meet is probably impossible.

Larry Klees spoke to the President and Vice President of ORCOPUG regarding a merger of the two clubs. The biggest obstacle was that they do not want to meet on Sunday.

California laws require we have officers: a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. We also need several people to be Directors on

the Executive Board. John Heenan has consented to be Treasurer again. Thank you, John. We also need to file with the state every year and maintain an insurance policy to retain our non-profit status. If we were to lose that status, our association with Omni-Tech, who comes to collect e-waste on even months, would have to change. There may be other repercussions of losing our non-profit status.

One requirement for Vice President is essentially being a backup for the President. One duty is to open the Main Meeting if the President can't make it.

Ted Littman isn't going to edit and publish the Orange Bytes newsletter, run the Reviews table or be Secretary. Several volunteers are needed. If we don't get enough volunteers, we may need to eliminate the Book/Software Reviews counter and the printed newsletter. The Orange Bytes newsletter is the image of the NOCCC to the world. We now have one volunteer to do an online version of the Bytes for one month. Also note that members have received thousands of dollars of books and software for free for doing the reviews of the products. Giving out the books and software is the easy part; the hard part is contacting publishers in order to get them to send us products for review.

We also need volunteers for setting up the coffee and donuts. Currently, Richard Miller sets up coffee and donuts and other things in the morning. Thank you, Richard. Bob Love has been bringing the donuts. Thank you, Bob.

Jim asked for ideas and suggestions, sorry, many of the details were inaudible. Jim stated that Board members should attend 9 of the 12 Board meetings and that the Vice President should attend 11 of the 12 Board meetings. Any member can come to the Board meeting, one of which will be held tomorrow.

Suggestions included changing the day of the Board Meeting to the same day as regular meeting. Other suggestions were to give free membership to Officers and Directors, to have more than one Vice President, that Officers and Directors should get perks to compensate them attending Board meetings and doing other chores.

The club By-laws currently state that Officers and Directors cannot be compensated for their work on behalf of the NOCCC. However, the By-Laws can be changed by a vote of the membership.

Methods of advertising were also mentioned. Regarding the OC Register, we had Stump the PC Club for several years. Then the volunteer who answered all the questions quit and could not be replaced. To get into the community calendar, someone has to send them something every week, and then it might not get in, based on their space needs. We are in competition with many other organizations. Placing an ad in the OC Register was also suggested. It was suggested that we place flyers in Senior Centers and other places, which has been done. However, retail establishments such Best Buy are difficult to persuade, because they don't want to display flyers for everyone. One member found out about the NOCCC at an ACP Swap Meet, but the closest now are in Long Beach and Los Angeles.

Jim described two types of commercial presentations: 1) A computer related company sponsors a presentation by an employee. This is difficult because of our low attendance at the Main Meeting. They are looking to address 60-100 people and possibly sell some product. 2) An employee of a computer related company comes on their own comes and gives a presentation. We have authorized a \$100 honorarium for these types of speakers. In general, we want most of the presentation to be educational in nature, but a bit of sales talk is allowed.

Jim turned to his preferred topic Google Voice (www.google.com/voice). He initially showed us a video from Google Voice. You need a Google account, but you use one Google account for Google Voice, Gmail, Picasa, iGoogle and other Google services. Using this free utility is not dependant on your phone or carrier. You can:

- Combine recipients phone numbers, that is, you can call one number to reach a person whether they are at home, work, or using their mobile phone.
- Get a Google Phone number and combine you own phone numbers. You can have Google Voice ring all, several or none of your individual phones, such as home, work and mobile depending on the time of day and the person calling. The Google phone number stays the same when you change carrier or phones. That way, you don't have to give out new numbers to people if you move or change carriers.
- As a substitute for Skype.
- You can set up different greetings depending on the caller.
- Text messages are in SMS. These, and voice mail messages can be converted into an email message (but SMS is an option on all phones). This saves money if you have pay for text messages.
- Call screening is available. That is you can listen in to the voice mail message and then decide to take the call or send it to voice mail
- Can make international and conference calls using Google Voice.
- You can also block callers.

Jim described this event as almost scary: He entered the name, phone number, email address and other data into his as a new contact. The phone went into the Internet and got the person's photo without checking or asking the contact's permission.

Jim then showed us a bit about Play.google.com, Google's attempt to become a provider of content. They are selling books, music, movies, games and other mobile device apps.

He also mentioned he did install a full version of Android on his Nook. Interestingly enough, he got it to work only when he had the Nook charger connected.

Another interesting meeting. See you next month.







We spent the 2nd half of the session planning to revert to the basics starting next month. Helen's worked so hard to achieve her desired goal but now we need to step back and go over the basics. I helped her get over the tough spots and we got a wonderful result. Now we'll go back and dig into the basics of Access so that she can make the database really hers.

In May we'll get into defining fields in the table and the properties of each field so that she's able to really be in control of her application. We won't get so deep that one needs to be a programmer but we will spend most of the coming sessions in the design mode so that the 'magic' gives way to simple understanding of how the app works. With that, she'll really be in charge of her creation.

A Simple Image Editor

I'm always looking for an inexpensive, small, and easy to use image editor. I spotted a review of a program called SnapSeed and thought this may be something beginning digital photographers could use. SnapSeed is the product of Nik software. Nik make filters and other products for Adobe Photoshop and they have a good reputation for quality products.

SnapSeed is only \$20 and can be download for 15 day trail period before you must pay. My review is as follows: It doesn't work as a Windows application. Review over.

I have no idea why it doesn't work but at a list price of \$20 I have no incentive to find an answer. SnapSeed: http://www.snapseed.com/home/ GPS And Your Photos

After the April meeting I started searching for an inexpensive device that would track my travel and then use that data with Adobe LightRoom to embed GPS data into the images. After searching the Internet I came upon the product: GiSTEQ PhotoTrackr Mini DPL900. It's a small device that only tracks your travel. It has no LCD screen for reading your location. The tracking data is then downloaded to your computer using its own application. You can read a review of my problems installing the application and getting the proper tracking file that can be used by Adobe Lightroom.

My problems with PhotoTrackr

Loses it's signal and has to re-sync. Many times PhotoTrackr would never re-sync and I had to turn off the device and then on again. Even walking round outside it would lose its way and had to re-sync. Sometimes it would re-sync on it's own and sometimes I had to turn it off then back on.

The devices inability to reliably acquire a signal after losing one is a real problem for me because I usually keep the device in my pocket and don't pay attention to it. I demonstrated to the members the process of downloading data from the PhotoTrackr device to the software application. Once this was done I could create a GPX file that's used by Adobe Lightroom.

In Adobe Lightroom I demonstrated using the GPX file to locate images on a map. Board Meeting Minutes

April 2, 2012, by Steven Breitbart

The NOCCC Board held its regular monthly meeting at President Jim Sanders' residence on Monday, April 2, 2012, at 7:48 p.m. All Board members attended except Dr. Patricia Adelekan. Also attending was NOCCC member Rudy Lauterbach. The Vice President's position is still open.

Secretary's Report: The minutes of the March 5th Board meeting published in the April 2012 Orange Bytes was motioned for approval. One objection was that in the Membership Report "after" should have been "before" and "several" should have been "one", After this, the motion to approve was seconded, and approved by all in attendance.

Treasurer's Report: given by John Heenan. Net income for coffee and donuts/cookies was - \$13.61. The raffle earned \$72. Cost to NOCCC of the prizes and dues received were not available. John also received the Articles of Incorporation from the State of California, which he had requested, because Wells Fargo Bank requested them. He said he will send Board Members a copy.

Memberships: He stated that member stats were Regular (1-yr.) = 148, Regular (3-yr.) = 3, Family = 4, College Student = 0, Newsletter = 12. This adds up to a total of 167 members. The Board accepted the Treasurer's report.

Opening & Closing: Slight problem with an electrical outlet.

Main Meeting: About 28 people attended. A long discussion followed about the future of the club. It might be easier for some people if we had the Board meeting the same day as the club meeting. Holding the Board meeting before, during or after the meeting was suggested. Using a restaurant or bringing in take-out food were also suggested. Another suggestion was to allow the Board members free dues. If the club paid for the meals or gave the Board members free membership, we would first need to change the By-laws to allow Board members to get compensation for serving on the Board. Gerry Resch and Steven Breitbart mentioned experiences at some local restaurants. Jim explained how a change to the By-laws, which are on line, would be done. He also stated that it would tend to make the meeting take longer.

Jim mentioned compensating the SIG leaders with free membership. Gerry said guidelines would be needed. Jim said that one requirement would be to submit a SIG report John Heenan also received the Articles of Incorporation from the State of California, which he had requested, because Wells Fargo Bank requested them. He said he will send Board Members a copy.

Someone suggested that the SIGs have a project and then presents a report to the general membership at the Main Meeting. A large amount of discussion by all present followed. It was suggested that the report would not have to be given by the SIG Leader. Jim stated that the SIG report for the Orange Bytes has been considered the product if the report covers what went on during the SIG and would help people find out more about the topic. Gerry suggested that rewarding the SIG Leaders would be the only way to get them to do any more. Gerry and Jim were not in favor of the SIG becoming a team with a project. For Gerry, it would prevent him from attending a different SIG every month, if he chooses to. It was stated that we have room for additional SIGs, we just need people to lead them. The leaders do not have to be experts in the subject. It was also stated that we cannot make these SIG meetings into watered-down college classes. If we do change the SIG rules, it may have to be done over time, but we cannot force the SIG leaders to do anything. It is probable that the SIG leader would quit the club and take some of his attendees along. New members, new ideas are definitely needed.

Programs: Next meeting on May 6th with the Board Meeting on May 7, 2012. Jim has not received the dates we can meet in the future. The speaker for May is uncertain as of this writing. Jim has been trying to get someone to talk about Adobe Insight and also trying to get someone from Viewsonic.

Public Relations: The Chapman University newspaper, the Panther, may publish a story about the NOCCC.

Publications & Reviews: There is a stock of items in the "To be Reviewed" category. We have some obligation to the Publishers to review the books after they send them to us for free.

Handing out the books, making sure we have correct information on the perspective reviewer is the easy part. The hard part is acquisition of the items which involves contacting the Publishers. Steven Breitbart suggested that we might reformat the style of the Review so the Review leader doesn't need to miss all the SIGs.

Membership: given by Ben Lochtenbergh.

Raffles: In the absence of Gerry, Steven Breitbart did the April meeting raffles. Ticket sales brought in \$72. Steven Breitbart got the winner's photos from John Krill, and matched them with the list taken down at the meeting. The resulting file was sent to Rudy for whatever form of Orange Bytes is issued. Jim hasn't gotten prizes for next month yet. Gerry said he will be back for the May meeting.

SIGs: by Dallas Hazleton. Dallas reported on attendance at the various SIG meetings. Attendance was: Advanced PC Q&A SIG (9 then later-23), Mobile Computing (10), Laptops, Smartphones, & Social Media (5), Beginners Digital Photography (7), Operating Systems (3), Linux (7), Advanced Digital Photography (7), Microsoft Access (2), Visual Programming (0), Access/Excel VBA (2), and Microsoft Office (0*). *The Instructor could not make it to the meeting.

Old Business: Progress is anticipated on giving Chapman funds for scholarships. The election slate published in the Bytes left people out who will run for Director: Dallas Hazelton, Gordon Strickland, Tia Christian and Ben Lochtenbergh. Dallas Hazelton discussed the possibility of bringing in an automobile simulator for a presentation. Gordon addressed the question of how GPS and associated programming works. Jim explained it and Ben mentioned he covered it in his SIG about a year ago.

New Business: Richard said he was going to talk to the Chapman Computer Science department for conducting an Apple SIG. Jim said that he'd suggested giving a student extra credit for participating in the NOCCC. Tia requested copies of the flyer prepared by Muriel Fitzsimmons, Jim said he would send her the document via email.

Rudy Lauterbach has volunteered to be the Webmaster and improve the club's web site. He is also going to create an on-line version of the Orange Bytes for this next month. However, it won't be the same and have all of the content of the printed Orange Bytes. The Bytes states that the Help Line Volunteers and SIG leader's names, phone numbers and email addresses only appear in the printed Orange Bytes. However, for the last few months, the information has been appearing in the web based version. Jim expressed the opinion that since the information has been released over the last few months, it would be nearly useless to hide the information now; it's already out there. It was considered that information of this type be accessible with a password or other criteria. Other options were also discussed. Also since we no longer have the "Stump the PC Club" in the OC Register it was suggested that we use the web site for answering computer related question.

The Proposed merger of any other club and NOCCC has been defeated. The other club does not want to meet on Sunday.

The Board meeting was adjourned at approximately 10 p.m.


Browser Notes:

1. Getting a printout of the Orange Bytes page:

<u>Screen</u> layout is 900 pixels width for the body (to emulate original PDF layout decisions). This gives adequate presentation on a monitor set up for 1024px width. However, this is typically too wide for portrait mode on most printers, i.e. some of the image will be chopped off. So, in Internet Explorer we typically use "Enable Shrink-to-Fit" for most printout purposes. (Other

browsers have a similar feature.) Per the image to the left, this is a checkbox under

File -> Print -> Page Setup. This allows full page rendering. HOWEVER, since everything gets shrunk, the text becomes smaller and harder to read. What to do? The font size could be made larger to make the shrunken text look larger. But it would also throw off the pagination code that is partially



present. Solution: A separate CSS style sheet will be used that just makes the

font size larger for printers. This is a work-in-progress. A temporary ALTERNATIVE: Use Landscape mode and disable shrink-to-fit. (But that would throw off the portrait-mode pagination code. Oh well . . . For the present, best to just live with the smaller printout text until the fix comes along.)

The worst-case scenario is: not enough members step forward to volunteer their time to be officers of the club, and I preside over its dissolution. That would be a real shame! NOCCC still provides a valuable service to most of its members, and in a trickle-down fashion, to their family, friends, and associates. Through our newsletter, particularly the online version of it, the club provides help and insight to a fairly large number of people. Meeting Information — The NOCCC meeting is held at Chapman University, in the Hashinger Science Center and Irvine Hall, near the corner of N. Center St. and E. Palm Ave., which is in the s outheast corner of the campus.

Parking Information - Chapman University's main parking lot is the underground Lastinger Parking Structure under Wilson field on the north side of the campus. Enter from Walnut Avenue, just east of Glassell Street. Parking is not free on Sunday, even if the gate is up. However, the permit vending machine is about 100 feet south of the entry area. There are other machines elsewhere in the lot. Find one, buy a permit, and put it on your dashboard. Do not park in any other lot, in a reserved space, or back into a space.

<u>Free street parking</u> also is available on the campus-side of the streets only. Parking in front of any residential housing will result in an expensive parking ticket. A City of Orange public parking lot, located on the southwest corner of E. Maple and N. Orange, is also free and only 2 blocks from the meeting.
