# About the Laptop Drawing

As we all know, our next meeting is December. As we all know, December is the month of Christmas. Initially it was to be one of the Evolve 3 model of laptop that I have talked about several times. Most interesting because it really is a pretty nice little laptop and for \$59 and some change one hell of a buy. The problem turned out that Micro Center was out of stock. And the only thing they had left was a couple of open box units. Probably the open box would be okay but there are a few complications that come up when you're talking about a machine that has been activated by somebody else. As a result, when I went on to the Micro Center site I found

that they had another special, a bit pricier, but overall a better deal. That deal was an Asus BR1100CKA-YS02 11.6 in laptop. While a bit more money, let's just say that it was within the authorized budget, if barely. Be that as it may, aside from costing a bit more money, the Asus laptop has a few very nice features. At the top of that list, it has a TPM module. For those of you who are immediately saying, what the hell is a TPM module, I have an answer. I will save you the effort of looking it up. That stands for Trusted Platform Module. It is used to improve the security of your PC. There is a gotcha associated with whether or not your computer has a TPM module. That gotcha is that Microsoft has decided that if your computer doesn't have a TPM module they will not allow you to, for free, online upgrade your Windows 10 operating system to Windows 11. They won't even allow you to install a copy of Windows 11 that you have purchased for your computer. Why would they do that? Not being a fly on the wall of the meeting room where that decision was made, I can only guess. I have, however, read other peoples conjecture about the possible reasons behind that decision. One of those conjectures I ran across several times. There were a number that suggested it was somehow related to the Bill and Malinda Gates Foundation support of "WOKE" policies in math education. Of course there were one or two doubting Thomas's that were skeptical of that altruism and had the audacity to ask if there was any possibility of collusion involved in the decision. One even went so far as to say he bet that if he was a fly on the wall of that meeting, he would have seen a room full of hardware venders drooling all over the table.
